> Producers participating in the 1972 wheat program must certify their planted acreage for harvest by June 20, 1972.

DISPOSITION OF SMALL GRAIN ON SET-ASIDE ACREAGE

The final date for disposition of small grain, rye, oats, wheat, and barley is June 20, 1972. If you have any of the above grain that is to be left standing for reseeding on set-aside acreage, you must file a written apnlication with the County Office before June 20, 1972.

SET-ASIDE ACREAGE

Select one regular craft class Set-aside acreage is to be cropland that would normally be planted to the crop being set aside in the absence of a program. The set-aside acreage must be cropland of average productivity for the crop being set aside. There will be a payment reduction for designating set-aside acreage below average productivity.

> Set-aside acreage is not to be grazed between May 1 and October 1. No crop can be harvested from set-aside acreage at any time. Activities-Burlap

Farm operators are reminded that they will be required to designate their set-aside acreage on a photocopy of their farm at the County ASCS Office at the time they file their setaside certification report.

FARM PAYMENTS


