If the travelling salesman and the farmer's daughter should continue to live together after direct threats of bodily harm have ceased to exist, the The conduct of the parties may constitute a ratification and turn a voidable marriage into a valid marriage.

By virtue of naving lived together as nusband and wife after arriving at the age of sixteen, even though for a short period of time, Sally has ratified and made valid and binding what was up to this time a voidable

marriage. In North Carolina the statutory age of consent for marriage is sixteen. Marriages of persons below the age of sixteen are merely voidable, not

NOTICE TO FARMERS WHO
HIRE LABOR AT ANYTIME
A farmer who employs
anyone in addition to members
of his family at anytime must
comply with the WilliamsSteiger Occupational Safety and
Health Act of 1970. Failure to do
so many subject him to severe
penalties.

penalties.
The Act requires farmers who hire anyone at anytime outside their own families to:

1. Display a 10 by 16-inch U.S. Department of Labor poster litled "Safety and Health Protection on the Job" at the point where employees normally report to work; and
2. Keep up-to-date and have

2. Keep up-to-date and have available for inspection a "Log of "Occupational Injuries and Illnesses." (Occupational Safety and Health Act (Osha) Form N. 100)

The poster is the cen-terspread of an 8 by 10-inch booklet called "Record-keeping Requirements," and Form No. 100 is also contained in the same booklet. Copies were mailed to most farmers, but anyone who was missed or has lost or misplaced his copy, may obtain another free from his Department of Labor Regional Office.

Rural as well as urban employers are required to report any work-related fatal accident within 48 hours. They must also maintain accurate records of, and make periodic reports on, work-related illnesses and injuries. Minor injuries need not be noted, but farmers should be aware of all conditions contained in the Occupational Safety and Health Act and comply with its safety stan-dards for agriculture.

The county ASCS office has available for inspection by farmers a copy of the U.S. Department of Labor's in-"Record-keeping Requirements" which contains the poster and Form No. 100 and Form No. 100 mentioned above. The county ASCS office can also supply a on the agricultural safety standards and addresses of regional Department of Labor offices for farmers who need

additional information or wish to order replacement copies of these materials for their per-FARMERS SHOULD KEEP PAYMENT COMPUTATION STATEMENTS

Producers who earn payments under the 1972 setaside program for feed grain, wheat, and cotton will receive payment computation statements along with their payment drafts. It is important for producers to retain these computation statements along with their other farm record. The computation statements provide these important details: 1. Program for which payment is made, (feed grain, wheat, or cotton), 2. Both gross and net payment, for entire farm and for individual producer, 3. Planted acreage

Projected yield, used for payment computations. Producers should verify their computation statements with their farm records before filing them in a safe place. If they have any questions, they should get in touch with the County ASCS office as soon as possible. If farm program computation statements are lost or destroyed, producers may obtain the information from records in the County ASCS

ment of 18.7 million acres is the same as previously announced. 2. Required set-aside equal to 86 per cent of the 1973 farm domestic allotment. 3. Additional set-aside up to 150 per cent of the 1973 farm

domestic allotment, Producers who choose this voluntary option must limit their 1973 wheat acreage to their 1972 wheat program acreage plus any additional 1972 set-aside minus the 1973 additional setaside acreage. The payment rate for additional set-aside will be 88 cents per bushel times the farm yield.

4. Price support loans at the National average of \$1.25 per bushel. There will be no loan discounts for undesirable varieties of wheat this year.

5. Barley will be a feed grain again in 1973 with a required set-aside of not less than 25 per cent of the barley base.
6. Substitution of feed grain

and soybean acreage as wheat acreage is authorized if needed to prevent loss of allotment. Notices of 1973 wheat allot-

ment and the required wheat set-aside acreage will be mailed in a few days.

HIGHLIGHTS OF U.S. CROP REPORT AS OF JULY 1, 1972 Corn acreage for grain harvest, at 57.3 million, is 10 per cent (6.5 million acres) less than 1971 and about the same as 1970. Projected production, at about 5.0 billion bushels, is 9 per cent below last year's record

crop.

Soybean acreage for beans, at 45.6 million is 8 per cent (3.2 million more than less year and 8 per cent above 1970. Projected production, at about 1,277 million bushels, is 9 per cent above last season.

Upland cotton acreage planted, at 13,7 million is 12 per cent (1.5 million acres) above

All what production is forecast at 1,551 million bushels, 5 per cent (89 million bushels) below last year but 13 per cent above 1970

Oat production is forecast at 712 million bushels, 19 per cent (164 million bushels) less than 1972 and 22 per cent less than

POSTCARDS MAILED

Double postcards requesting estimated acreage of all crops planted for the 1972 crop year have been mailed to all farm operators who did not certify and are not participating in the 1972 Feed Grain, Wheat, and Cotton Programs. Crop acreage planted on the farm should be listed in the appropriate spaces on the card and returned to the county ASCS office. Failure to return the card will cause the farm to lose history credit for the base acreage. The card should be signed by the farm operator and returned to the county office immediately.

Veterans Administration

A new insurance plan designed to help holders of GL insurance when they grow older is explained in Veterans Ac-ministration pamphlets being mailed this month to 175.000 holders of National Service Lite Insurance (NSLI) term policies who are between ages 60 and 65.

H.W. Johnson, Director of the Winston-Salem VA Regional Office said the forms and pamphlets explaining the "Modified Life - Age 76" 'Modified Life - Age policies and how to apply for will be mailed to an addition? two million younger vet. ans as their term policies come up for renewal at the end of their current five year periods.

Premiums on term policies. rise substantially every fiveyears, Johnson explained: making it difficult for some veterans to maintain full coverage as they grow olden

On the new insurance, premiums remain the same through the life of the policy. and at age 70, coverage is reduced by 50 per cent.

Modified life age 70 insurance is available also to about 400,000 veterans insured under VASS modified life age 65 plan. Thesa veterans have until July 2, 1973. regardless of health, to apply for the new plan which provides full coverage for an additional five years.

Veterans whose modified life policies were reduced 50 per .cent at age 65 can have themrestored to the original. amounts. This entails a slightly higher premium and a small additional sum to balance the higher cash value of the new modified life age 70 policy.
