What are the ominous direction for winds to blow from? Can useful weather information be obtained from the use of a wind vane only?

The worst weather in the United States often follows winds out of the east or north. Yes, it's possible to detect valuable clues about the weather using only a wind vane. If one will combine the vane with a barometer, the accuracy of predictions will be raised many times.

However, with only a wind vane, be suspicious of a wind change from the east to the north. If the sky looks threatening (or a barometer reading shows pressure falling) you might well be in for a bad storm.

Likewise, a wind changing from south to east is often a bad omen. Remember that bad weather systems in this country (low pressure areas) move counter-clockwise, and move eastwards. Wind changes often reveal what section of this circular movement you are then in.

## Public Library Film Service

Motion picture history, production techniques, and creative usage were the topics of a two-day seminar recently conducted for all people—North Carolina librarians.

collections of their own which can be checked out in much the same fashion as books. The State Library in Raleigh, in addition, makes its full collection of more than 2,000 films readily available to any citizen through interlibrary loan.

Films are listed in the catalog alphabetically by title and subject. They run the gamut from "A is for Architecture" to "The Zoo and You" and from "accidents" to "zoning." Many films are primarily informational, and others lean more toward entertainment.

Conducted by the Audiovisual Center of the State Library in Raleigh, the seminar reflected a growing awareness of the role motion pictures can play in disseminating information and entertainment through North Carolina's public libraries.

What this means is that any person in the state can go to his local library whether its in one of our largest cities or smallest communities, consult the 268-page film catalog published by the State Library, and request any film for use up to one week at no charge.

Last week's seminar was designed to better acquaint local librarians themselves with the value of motion picture films as library lending material and to make them more aware of the State Library's film services.

## Know Your Social Security

Chances are that when you think about social security you think mostly about older people and retirement and Medicare. But that's not the whole story, not by a long shot. Social Security can also mean a lot to young people. It can mean monthly cash benefits to disabled workers and their families; it can mean monthly checks to widowed mothers and their children.
