By a narrow margin, W. Stanford White lost the right to call for a run-off. He placed third in the peoples' choice for two Representatives for the First District. Now that Mr. W. T. Culpepper has stepped down, it seems morally right that the candidate having the next highest number of votes should be nominated by the First District House Committee when it meets in the next several days.
