## SCS Career Opportunities

Career opportunities with the USDA-Soil Conservation Service are open to college undergraduates in a variety of fields. It was announced today by State Conservationist Jesse L. Hicks in Raleigh.

Those working toward degrees in agriculture, forestry, wildlife biology, agricultural engineering or civil engineering are eligible to apply for the jobs. Openings exist for freshmen, sophomores and juniors, the state conservationist said.

The careers begin with summer jobs as student trainees majoring in the disciplines mentioned, "but they step into full-time professional jobs as soil conservationists, soil scientists and civil engineers when they graduate," Mr. Hicks pointed out.

To qualify for employment, he said, "students must qualify in a federal Civil Service examination."

Those interested should write or visit the state administrative officer of the USDA-Soil Conservation Service in Room 534 of the Federal Building at 310 New Bern Avenue in Raleigh. The mailing address is Post Office Box 27307, Raleigh, North Carolina 27611.

Students may also get information and assistance from their college placement officer.

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## Hillary G. Winslow Dies In Fayetteville



Hillary Goode Winslow, 76, a native of Perquimans County, died Tuesday, October 11, in Fayetteville, N.C. He was a retired insurance company executive.

Winslow as a commissioned

officer in World War II. In 1921 he was appointed acting postmaster of Hertford and in 1922, clerk of the Perquimans County Superior Court where he served for 12 years. In 1936 he was elected Mayor of Hertford.

He earned an L.L.B. degree at the University of North Carolina in 1917 and operated an insurance Agency from 1920 to 1960.

He was the son of the late Watson Winslow and Ellen Goode Winslow of Perquimans County. His mother published a book History of Perquimans County in 1931.

Surviving Mr. Winslow at death is his wife, Mr. Evelyn Carter Winslow; a daughter, Mrs. Katherine W. Lindsay of Fayetteville; a son, Hillary G. Winslow, Jr., of Sylva; a brother, W. Frith Winslow of Plymouth; two grandsons Kemp and Sam Lindsay of Fayetteville.
