Hog, Beef Prices Good Early

1973 should be a good year for North Carolina livestock farmers but probably not quite as good as 1972, which has been an exceptionally high income year.

North Carolina State University extension economists, in their year-end analysis, report that, "Overall, the 1973 outlook for slaughter hogs suggests only slightly lower prices than in 1972." In fact, prices may average slightly higher during the first half of the year and move to moderately lower levels during the third and fourth quarters.

The economists believe slaughter prices will average around \$25 per hundredweight in North Carolina. Based on past relationships among supply, demand and prices, slaughter prices are expected to average \$26 to \$27 or better for January and February before beginning a downward trend, possibly to the \$22-\$23 range by April.

Prices may strengthen seasonally to average about \$26-\$27 during the summer. After that, a real turning point may be reached. If producers may average \$1 to \$2 per hundred pounds lower than last year, due largely to anticipated higher feed costs.

The price pattern may look something like this for slaughter cattle, based on the Omaha market for Choice cattle: \$37-\$38 during January-continue to expand, large supplies of pork could

Know Your Social Security

The new social security law will reduce the 6-month waiting period for disability benefits to 5 months, effective in January. The first benefit will be payable for the 6th month of disability, rather than for the 7th month of disability as under present law.

For example, a worker disabled on January 15, 1973, can begin getting benefits for July 1973, with the check for July delivered in early August. Previously his benefits would begin for August with the check delivered in September.

The new provision will also affect disabled widows and dependent widowers who are eligible for benefits on the basis of disability. In 1973, the new law will mean \$108 million in additional benefits to 950,000 disabled workers and their families.

Reducing the waiting period by one month will help to relieve some of the financial hardships faced by disabled people who have little or no savings or other resources to fall back on. Social security pays monthly benefits to eligible workers and their families if the worker is severely disabled and expected to be unable to work for a year or more.

More than 7 million disabled workers and 1.3 million dependents get \$280 million a month in social security benefits.

Forest Owners Can Anticipate Good Markets

The expanding forest industry is expected to continue its bullish ways in 1973, according to North Carolina State University foresters.
