Brave Old Days

The Dare Coast is laden with the lore of ships and the sea. Cape Hatteras has claimed hundreds of ships and lives, and the history of the coast is filled with tales of the heroic men of the lifesaving stations along the desolate beaches.

One of them is the story of the British bark Josie Troop of Saint John, New Brunswick. The vessel went aground on February 22, 1889. Efforts of the men at the Chicaniomico Station at Rodanthe resulted in saving the lives of 11 of the crew of 17.

Their heroic work won the praise of Queen Victoria.
