Under the leadership of Dr. Joe Pou, 1972 Christmas Seal Chairman, \$91,987.60 was contributed in the Eastern Lung Association's 22 county area. Of this amount, total contributions for the following county is: Perquimans County-

\$2,020,81. Pruette said this support enables the association to provide information programs about lung diseases, support professional education and research, and support cooperative work with health departments, schools, colleges, nurses, doctors and social welfare agencies for the community.s general

Funds contributed to the Eastern Lung Association through the annual Christmas Seal Campaign will continue to be spent in the area on these efforts, Pruette said.

The National organization was formed in 1904; the North Carolina agency two years later. Affiliate agencies like the Eastern Lung Association, evolved from local service units into agencies serving various regions of the state.


