Students have been informed of a new curriculum of social studies. Mini-courses are to be taught on a trial basis for the '73-74 school term.

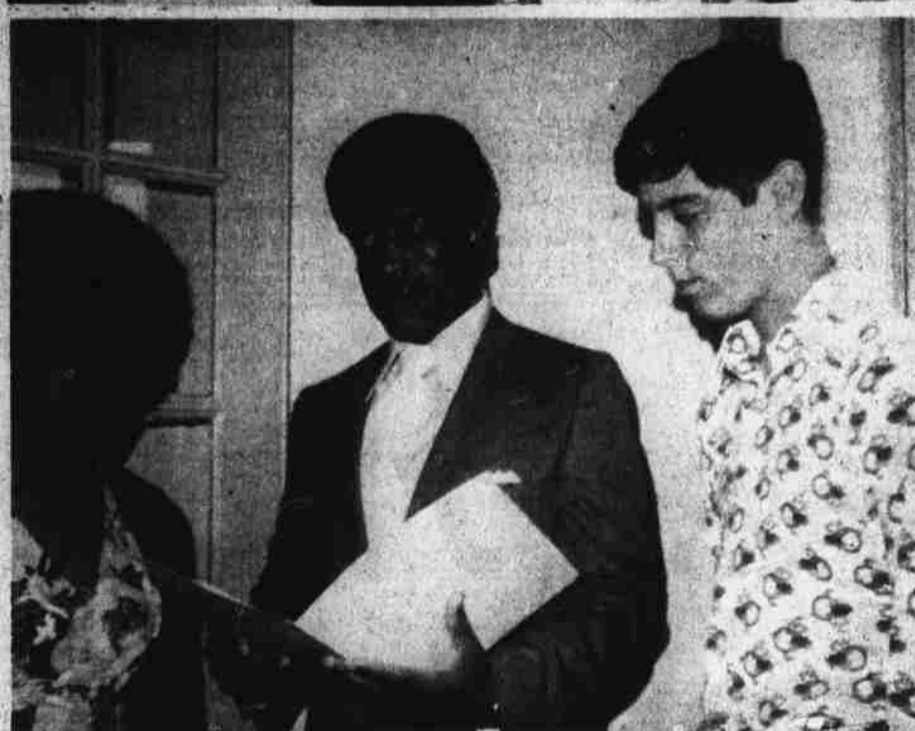

RALEIGH — The North Carolina State Troopers are preparing for a heavily traveled weekend, as North Carolinians celebrate Memorial Day.

Troopers are reminding motorists that excessive speed and drinking drivers play an unwelcome part in holiday traffic collisions. Last year of the 1111 traffic collisions over the Memorial Day weekend, 1042 traffic law violations were involved 21 persons killed and more than 700 injured... some of them for life.

The official Memorial Holiday period or recording traffic collisions, deaths and injuries begins at 6 p.m., Friday, May 25, and ends midnight, Monday, May 28.
