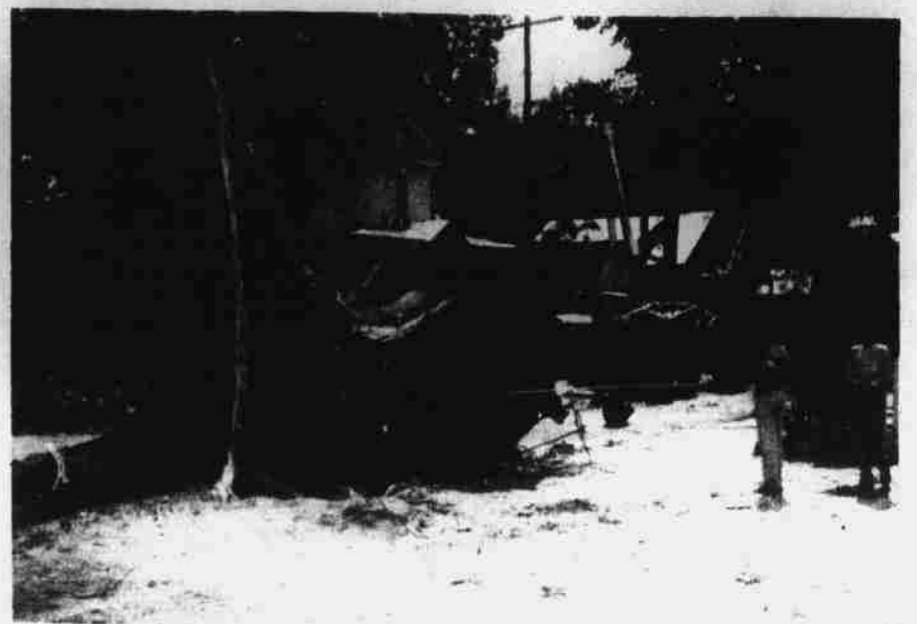

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Jobs For Youths Available In Area

Area Neighborhood Youth Corps to receive \$155,600.00 to provide 389 jobs for high school youth this summer.

Project Director John T. Biggers, representing the sponsor, The Economic Improvement Council, is in Charlotte,

North Carolina this week meeting with the U.S. Department of Labor officials from Atlanta for the purpose of negotiating a contract for the NYC summer program. Before leaving Hertford Wednesday Biggers stated the summer NYC project would provide meaningful jobs for 389 boys and girls as they earn \$1.60 per hour for 26 hours per week. At the same time they will be performing services for public agencies and learning to face the world of work (The NYC motto EARN-LEARN-SERVE).

In order to be eligible for the summer jobs certain income criteria and must be planning to return to high school in September. Applications and more information can be secured at any of the Resource Centers or at the Neighborhood Youth Corps office, Edenton Air Base - Telephone 482-4495. Counselors will be visiting each county center to assist with filling out applications.

Hertford Child Killed By Auto

HERTFORD — Carl Linwood Hardy, 3, was killed late Friday afternoon in Hertford when he reportedly darted across Skinner's bridge in the path of an automobile.

The boy was walking across the span with four other family members about one-quarter of a mile from his home when the accident occurred. Jack Steve Harrell, 19, of Rt. 2, Hertford was identified as driver of the car which struck Hardy. Hertford Police are still investigating the circumstances surrounding the boy's death. No charges have been filed at this time.

Court

Judge Wilton Walker presided at the Wednesday session of Perquimans County District Court and heard the following cases:

In Civil Court—an absolute divorce was granted in the case of Thomas C. Tilley vs Barbara Leigh Tilley.

Other actions included: Tommy Lacy, Joe Harvey Ferrell, Thomas Phillip Roby, Roy Morrison each charged with being drunk and disorderly, were found not guilty.

Sherman Thompson, charged with assault, was given 30 days suspended for 2 years with the following conditions-1. pay a fine of \$10.00 and costs, 2. be and remain of good behavior and not violate any State or Federal laws, 3. not in any way intimidate or harass prosecuting witness, Joel Perry, Jr., for 2 years;

James Purcell Skinner was found guilty of the same charge and received the same sentence;

Matthew Mathias White was found guilty of carrying a concealed weapon and was given a 6 months sentence for 1 year with the following conditions-1. pay a fine of \$50.00 and costs, 2. remain on good behavior and not violate any State or Federal laws for a period of 2 years, 3. not carry any fire arms on person for 2 years, 4. on to be confiscated Sheriff's Department.

Student Loan Available At COA

"Students who will begin college for the first time this coming September may qualify for a new financial aid program," Gary Parsons, Director of Financial Aid at College of The Albemarle said as he started to go over the details in the circular on his desk.

"This program is new and we hope that many of this year's high school graduates will consider it," he began. Parsons then explained that this new program—the Basic Opportunity Grant Program—was among the education bills recently passed by Congress. It has now been signed into law by the President.

"The B.O.G.—as we call it—provides up to \$1,400 for educational expenses for eligible students," he said. "It is not a loan that has to be paid back but a grant to go to school with."

He said that any student who plans to attend College of The Albemarle may qualify. But there are steps to be taken to find out exactly who is eligible.

"A student first must complete and mail for evaluation a Request for Determination of Family Contribution Form. This form, which will probably be

available some time in June, can be picked up at a public library, any post office or a college financial aid office," Parsons said.

He pointed out that although there is no charge for the evaluation of the form, not until the form is completed, mailed, and the evaluation returned can the award be made.

"If a student who has already been accepted for enrollment at COA brings this evaluation in to me," Parsons said, "I can tell him in a few minutes exactly what his grant would be."

Not all students qualify for the B.O.G., however, for it only affects those who begin college for the first time in September. However, Parsons added this next year COA will continue to have Direct Student Loans, Work-Study, and Educational Opportunity Grants. And next fall, even part-time students may qualify for all these programs, he pointed out.

"Students who plan to attend COA next fall and would like to know more about the available financial aid program can come by this summer. I would be more than glad to explain all details to them," Parsons said.
