Bacteria flourishes in hot weather-- and food poisoning is a most unwelcome guest at any outing. Remember, in the sun, it is very important that picnic foods are kept wholesome from the time you leave home to the time you settle down to eat. To keep food weather the Animal and

Plant Health Inspection Service of USDA wants you to remember a few things you should follow in the preparation and preservation perishable foods.

Favorite picnic foods like hamburgers, fried chicken, salads, frankfurters, and sandwiches all need the same care, basically. The first thing to remember when going on a picnic is that germs grow faster in weather, naturally, there are some "pre-picnic" precautions you should take after you reach the picnic site.
