Fruit fritters have long been a dessert favorite with Europeans—it's about time that Americans too discovered their delights! In this recipe, chunks of ripe banana are dipped into a rich batter (quickly and easily made from complete pancake mix and water), then fried 1-2-3 in deep hot fat until crisp and golden brown. Drain them well and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Serve very hot, accompanied by a warm rum sauce—also an easy make, also surearly

BANANA FRITTERS WITH RUM SAUCE Makes 6 servings

Rum Sauce.

Fritters:

34 cup sifted confectioners

For fritters, peel bananas and cut each crosswise into 4 pieces. Combine pancake mix and water; dip banana pieces in batter. Fry in hot deep fat (375°F.) about 1 minute or until golden brown. Drain thoroughly on absorbent paper. For rum sauce, combine sugar and cornstarch in small sauce-pan; stir in cream. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened and smooth. Stir in butter and rum.

To serve, place 4 warm fried banana pieces on each serving plate. Sprinkle with confectioners sugar. Serve with warm rum

The new

Ingram recently testified before the U.S. Senate Committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs that he is opposed to the creation of a federal bureauracy when private enterprise is prepared to protect the public from unsafe construction of mobile homes.

"The North Carolina approach seems the most reasonable beause it creates neither a federal nor state bureauracy." Ingram said.

The North Carolina Depart-Insurance's of engineering division monitors inspections by independent testing agencies of mobile home inspection plants to see that the mobile homes meet North Carolina standards as specified by the N. C. Building Code

Council. Ingram said that his collided head-on with mobile home manufacturers statements in suppport of the federal legislation which would allow manufacturers to selfcertify that construction meets federal standards. The legislation, as presently written, does not require plan approval and in-plant inspections to assure that the manufac-

turers are complying with the

federal standards

Ingram said he was encouraged by remarks by Sen. John Sparkman, D.-Ala., chairman of the committee. Sparkman, one of the original signers of the bill, said that the proposed legislation "needs a whole lot of work" before it would be acceptable to

After Ingram's testimony, Proximire, Wisc., assigned a member of his staff to work with the N. C. Department of Insurance in writing a committee sustitute which would not undermine effective regulatory programs in states such as North Carolina

"North Carolina has led the way in protecting mobile home buyers from shoddy, inadequate and unsafe con-

struction," Ingram said. "In North Carolina, we believe the public not only demands but deserves that we go forward

with true consumer reforms." The only alternative to the safeguards North Carolina recieves through its independent testing program "would bureauracy," Ingram said. "This is the crux of the matter
