Emergency Medical Program Organized

Committees were named and guidelines tentatively accepted for a Region "R" Emergency Medical Services Program recently at an organizational meeting held in Edenton.

James E. Lewis, executive director of Albemarle Human Resources Development system, said a \$20,000 grant has been received from the state to develop an Emergency Medical Services Program in the 10-county Albemarle Area.

Harold McKinney, assistant to Lewis, said the ultimate goal of the council is to provide better communications and training, upgrade equipment and work for more efficient service and greater coordination among all involved in emergency medical service.

On hand for the meeting were representatives from fire departments, rescue squads, law enforcement

agencies, nursing, hospital administration, hospital medical staff, county commissioners and municipal officials.

McKinney said Region "R" rates second in the state in the need for emergency medical services. He listed some of the objectives of the organization as trained personnel providing 24-hour service; certain standard training, central communication system, an adequate, accessible facilities capable of continued service, access to a critical care facility, utilization of public safety assets and service first regardless of the ability to pay.

Tentative organization of the group has been done by an advisory committee comprised of Dr. James Slade of Edenton, who is a member of the state Emergency Medical Service Council, Tom Surratt, ad-

ministrators, Chowan Hospital, T. R. Sprull of Roper, chairman of the board of commissioners for Washington County, and Wesley Cullipher, director of the Albemarle Regional Planning and Development Commission.

A nominating committee was named including Charles Skinner of Hertford, Bill Hartman of Elizabeth City and Macon Johnson of Camden. They will recommend a permanent chairman, vice chairman and secretary.

Named to review the bylaws were John Outten, Bud Amburn, Maury Ashley and Tom Surratt.

The council will have a supportive staff of McKinney, Don Young and Bill Griswold. Young, director of the Albemarle Alcoholism Program, will move to EMS July 1 as health planner. Griswold, who joined the system June 1, will be in charge of expediting operations.

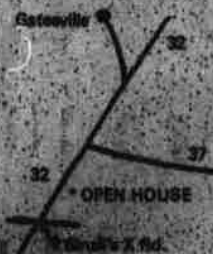
