Clam Changes

Anyone who gathers clams this summer should read the recent changes in coastal commercial and sport fisheries regulations, according to law en-forcement officials of the North Carolina Division of Commercial and Sports Fisheries.

A new regulation, cer-tified June 27 by the Secretary of State, puts a minimum size limit on clams. No person shall take, attempt to take, possess, sell, or purchase any clams which have a shell length of ess than 11/2 inches. Freshwater clams are exempted from this regulation.

Changes were also made in Newport River and Cape Fear boundaries of polluted areas where clams and

areas where clams and oysters may not be gathered.

The remainder of the new and amended regulations pertain mostly to commercial fishermen. Changes were made in gill net regulations, trotline regulations, mesh size limit on butterfly shrimp nets, and in Pender County the demarcation line from

ShouldApply

Students and other people planning to get summer jobs should apply soon for a social security number if they don't have one.

Applications from people who don't recall having had a social security number before generally are screened against central files in Baltimore to make sure a second number isn't issued to the same person.

Screening takes time, so you should apply for your number several weeks before you need it for a job covered by social security.

People can get information about applying for a social security number by calling, writing, or visiting any social security office. More than nine out of 10 jobs are covered by social security.

Your social security number is yours alone and remains the same for life. A

worker builds retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection by work and earnings credited to his social security number. So when you get a job covered by social security, be sure your employer copies your name and number correctly from your social security card to us records.

People applying for a social security number for the first time may be asked to prove their age, identity, and citizenship.

If you've lost your social security card, you can get a duplicate by contacting any social security office. You can get a duplicate faster if you've kept the stub that came with your social security card.
