

New Rule Set For Trappers

Trappers in Perquimans County and throughout the state are reminded that according to the 1974-75 hunting and trapping regulations, it is unlawful to set a trap that does not include an attached metal tag

bearing the owner's name and address.

The regulation reads as follows:

Identification and Attendance of Traps: It shall be unlawful to set any trap unless there is securely attached thereto an indestructible metal tag bearing in legible English the name and address of the person setting the same. Every trap shall be visited daily and any animal caught therein removed.


