

# Adult Education Association Meets

Mrs. M.B. Taylor, Home Economics Extension Agent, attended the Annual Conference of the North Carolina Adult Education Association which convened October 9-11, at the Holiday Inn — Tour Seasons, Greensboro, North Carolina. The Conference theme was, "Adult Education — A Guest For Quality Living In a Changing North Carolina". The Conference opened with a reception honoring the President, Mrs. Minnie Miller, Brown. This was followed by the banquet with Honorable James B. Hunt, Jr., Lieutenant Governor, State of North Carolina who gave the keynote address: "The conference opened Thursday morning with a special film on "Why Man Creates". Dr. Gerald B. James, President of Rockingham Community College, Wentworth, N.C. presented Dr. Selz C. Mayo, Professor and Head, Department of Sociology and Anthropology, and Dr. W.D. Toussaint, Professor and Head, Department of Economics from North Carolina State University, Raleigh, North Carolina. They discussed the Emerging Socioeconomic Trends in North Carolina during the 70's.

Mrs. Holshouser, Jr. spoke on "The Creative Use of Volunteers in Contemporary North Carolina". Mrs. M.B. Taylor, was one of the honor guests who accompanied and recognized at the guest table with Mrs. Holshouser, Jr. She was introduced by Dr. Frances Dawson.

The conference closed on Friday with a General Session and a Leadership Recognition Luncheon. During the General Session, Dr. Charles M. Barrett, Associate Vice-President for Educational Programs, N.C. Department of Community Colleges, Raleigh, presided.

Dr. Barrett presented the guest speaker Dr. James A. Christenson, Professor of Sociology and Anthropology North Carolina State University. Dr. Christenson spoke on "What North Carolinians Want".

During the Leadership Recognition Luncheon, Dr. Ron Shearon, Program Chairman, presided. Dr. Susan G. Kelly presented Dr. Edgar J. Boone, Professor and Head, Department of Adult and Community College Education at North Carolina State University. Dr. Boone spoke on "On Being Professional".

During the service special awards were made and new officers were installed.

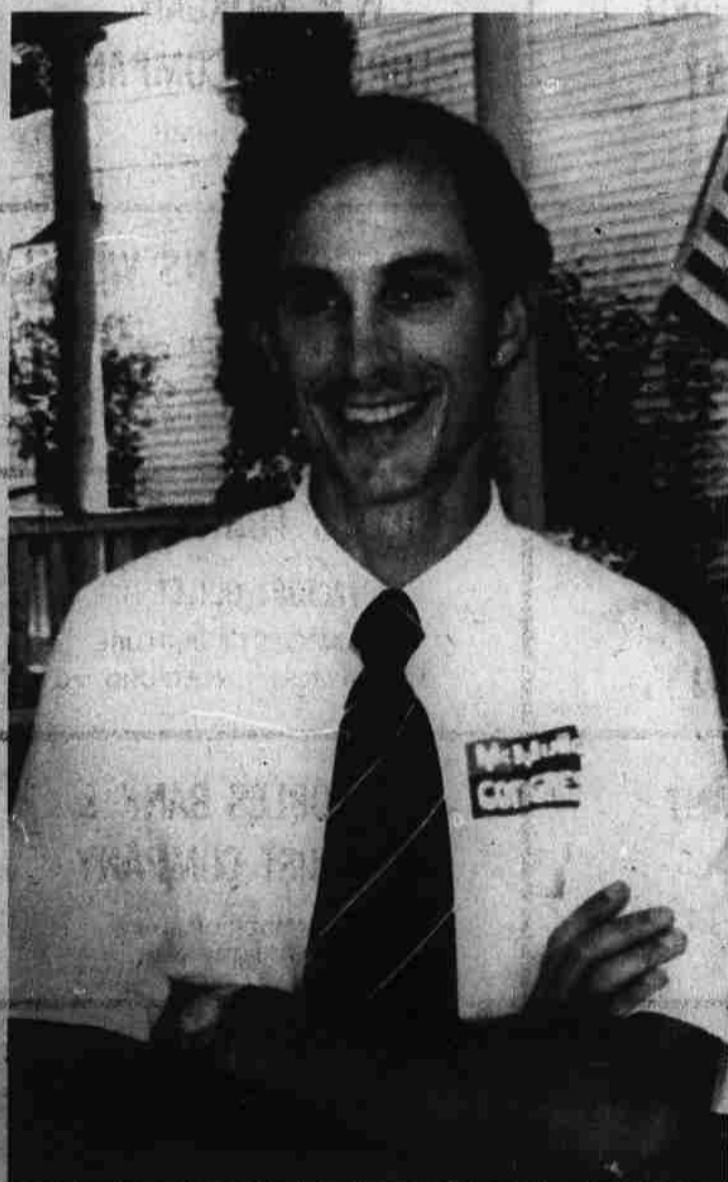

HARRY McMULLAN III was born in Washington, North Carolina in April, 1947 and grew up on his family's farm near the town.

His father, the late Harry McMullan, Jr., was a prominent local businessman, and his grandfather, Harry McMullan, Sr., was a highly regarded Attorney General of North Carolina for seventeen years until his death in 1955.

He attended public schools in Washington through grammar school, and graduated from an international high school in Rolle, Switzerland.

His first two years of college were at Davidson, and after two more years at Chapel Hill, he graduated in 1968 and returned to Eastern North Carolina.

McMullan has had business experience. He manages three farms totalling around 2,000 acres, in addition to 40,000 acres of timberland which is mostly located in West Virginia. There, his company has been cited for excellence in forest management, proving that environmental considerations and business can live together acceptably.

This past June 15th, he and the former Elizabeth Matthews, also of Washington, were married. Their home is in Washington Park, Washington, North Carolina.

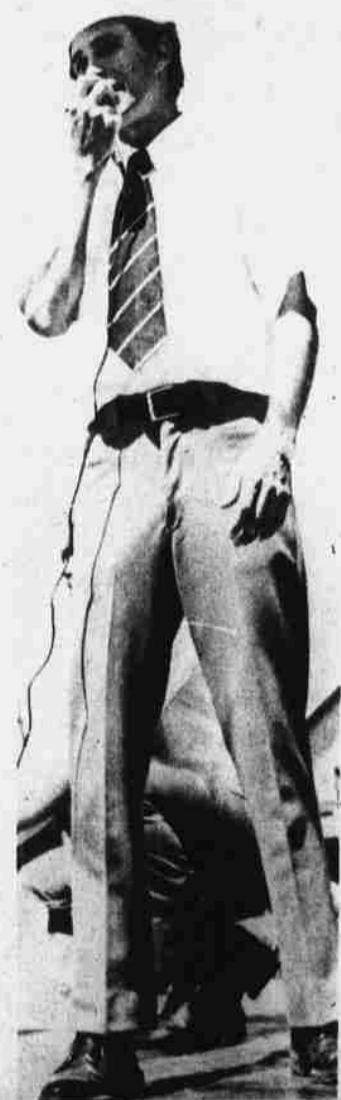


McMullan knows what it means to have spiritual convictions. He has spent much time working to further a deeper understanding of God. The need for a spiritual emphasis is, in fact, a major element of his campaign.

If elected, Harry McMullan will vote to drastically cut the size and cost of government. He believes that the free-spending, printing-press money policies of Congress can bring us to nothing but economic chaos and ruin. "It is dishonest and cowardly for Congress to continue to spend more than they take in," said McMullan. "They are causing inflation and piling up a national debt for our children that is becoming more unpayable every year."

He believes that free men and women are capable of solving their own problems, and is strongly opposed to federal intrusion in local affairs. He believes that Congress should be more concerned with repealing bad legislation than with enacting more of the same old socialistic red-tape, rules and regulations.
