The Soil Conservation District Supervisors and their supporter were called upon for greater input in state-wide and land-use planning by Lt. Gov. James E. Hunt as he spoke to some 450 assembled in the Jaycee Community Building for the Area V. meeting of North Carolina Association of Soil Water Conservation Districts. He quoted from a national survey by a Duke University scientist which showed North Carolinians loved their state best, "But we have to be come more and more involved to maintain this attitude," he said

He compared the importance, of agricultural products with oil from Arabia. "We must put emphasis on agriculture ... we must use prime agriculture land for agricultural purposes and assure the land owners that they get a fair price for their products," he went on.

Lt. Gov. Hunt is the son of a retired Soil Conservation Service employee, said in the early days you could wear out the land and move on. "This unwise practice, as the nation became more populated, alerted the concern of the people.


