Hunt Speaks With Soil Supervisors

The Soil Conservation District Supervisors and their supporter were called upon for greater input in state-wide and land-use planning by Lt. Gov. James E. Hunt as he spoke to some 450 assembled in the Jaycee Community Building for the Area V. meeting of North Carolina Association of Soil & Water Conservation Districts. He quoted from a national survey by a Duke University scientist which showed North Carolinians loved their state best, "But we have to be more and more involved to maintain this attitude," he said.

He compared the importance of agricultural products with oil from Arabia. "We must put emphasis on agriculture ... we must use prime agriculture land for agricultural purposes and assure the land owners that they get a fair price for their products," he went on.

Lt. Gov. Hunt is the son of a retired Soil Conservation Service employee, said in the early days you could wear out the land and move on. "This unwise practice, as the nation became more populated, alerted the concern of the people."

"When the chips are down the people of America respond," he continued. To day we face a crisis which people will respond to, if they are shown the right direction. We must maintain the philosophy that this is our land to use wisely."

Lt. Gov. Hunt said more people should become concerned about the non-farming erosion. He noted that the most erosion he has witnessed is around the cities. Abuses of the land has caused the state to get into land-use planning, he said in reference to the Coastal Land Management Act.

Lloyd C. Bunch of Chowan County was re-elected chairman of the 20-county district I. Miller Warren of Washington County was elected vice-chairman and A.B. Etheridge, Pasquotank County was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The group was welcomed by Mayor Roy L. Harrell of Edenton.

Jesse L. Hicks, state conservationist, lauded the federal, state and local cooperation in the SCS program and said his department is very humble about this partnership.

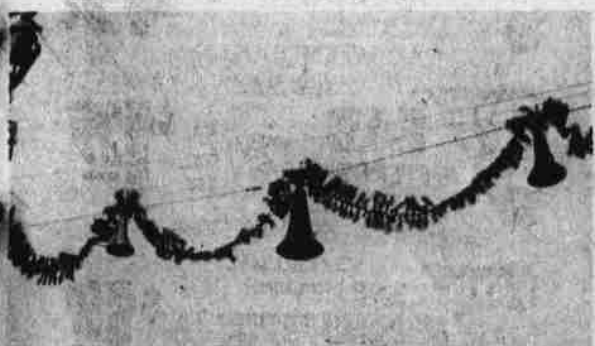

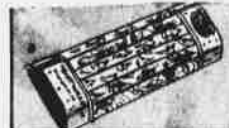
