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Miss Newby Joins Cystic Fibrosis Foundation Drive

Miss Mary Helene Newby of 207 Grubb St., Hertford has been named campaign chairman for Perquimans County according to Mrs. Robert B. (Katie) Morgan, State Honorary Chairman for the North Carolina Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. The foundation supports research in children's lung damaging diseases such as cystic fibrosis, asthma with lung damage, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis and childhood emphysema.

recognized nationally for its contribution to research in children's lung diseases.

Cystic Fibrosis, the most serious of children's lung diseases, is found one in every 1500 births, occurs when both parents are carriers of this recessive gene. It is estimated that one in 20 people are carriers. Life expectancy of a cystic fibrosis patient is now 18 compared to 10 in 1964. While improved methods of treatment have added 10 years to life expectancy since 1964, still, there is no cure.

The Duke Cystic Fibrosis center at the Duke Medical Center in Durham, N.C. is one of 117 centers in the country supported by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. This is a care, teaching and research center and is

Town Obtains Used Jeep

When accidents or fires occur in places difficult to reach, a problem usually arises for fire department or rescue squad members. Recently this has been changed due to the Town of Hertford acquiring a jeep.

Talmadge Rose, Town of Hertford Civil Preparedness Coordinator, recently announced that he obtained the jeep from Camp Lejeune in Jacksonville, N.C. Getting the jeep is in itself good news, but obtaining it at no charge makes the news even better. Rose explained that he heard that

several jeeps were available and he put in applications for two jeeps, thinking one could be used by the Hertford Volunteer Fire Department and the other by the Perquimans County Rescue Squad. One jeep was granted and he said there is a possibility of obtaining a second one.

He described the vehicle as an "old marine corps jeep with four-wheel drive and very maneuverable." Rose explained that a truck was taken to Camp Lejeune to pick up the jeep and he went not knowing in what condition the vehicle would

be. He said he was pleasantly surprised to find the jeep only needed a paint job and a few minor repairs such as replacing one of the two windshield.

Due to the jeep's maneuverability and four-wheel drive, Rose explained it will probably be used on permanent loan to the fire department. He said it would not be used in reaching those fires which the department's regular trucks can't get to. In order to do this, a trailer carrying a tank of water will be hooked onto the jeep. Rose added that since it was not

do not have on hand the life-saving fluid donated by concerned citizens.

Red Cross officials have pointed out that every 17 seconds someone in the United States needs blood. Since there is no substitute for human blood and no way to manufacture it, these people will die if hospitals

Blood collections in Perquimans County were insufficient last year to say the least. A total of 214 units of blood were collected but the year's goal was 351 units. The blood collection goal is based on how much blood county residents used the year before.

The blood donated by

Perquimans County residents could be used for the life of a neighbor, a newborn baby, an injured relative or a sick friend.

The short time it takes to donate a unit of blood could mean a lifetime for someone else.

The bloodmobile visit is being sponsored by the Perquimans County Jaycees on July 9 at the Hertford United Methodist Church from 2-6 p.m.

District Court Held

Judge Jack Chaffin presided at the Wednesday session of Perquimans County District Court and heard the following cases:

In Civil Action, a divorce was granted to Joseph Nowell vs Ann A. Nowell.

Other cases heard were: George Edward Armstrong, Jr., charged with carrying a concealed weapon, was given a 90-day sentence suspended for 2 years, a fine of \$100.00 and costs, was told not to violate any Federal, State, or local laws for 12 months, and not to have any firearms in his possession for 2 years. The weapon was confiscated and turned over to the Sheriff's Department;

The 2 charges of assault on a female against Clement Holly were consolidated for judgment and the defendant received a 6 months sentence suspended for 2 years, a fine of \$50.00 and

costs of court in each case, and ordered not to assault Martha Sutton or Sally Sutton for a period of 2 years;

Matthew Mathias White was found guilty of driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor and speeding and was given a 90-day sentence suspended for 2 years, a fine of \$250.00 and costs, ordered not to operate a motor vehicle until licensed to do so, and not to violate any Federal, State, or local laws. An appeal was noted and the case was placed on the Superior Court Docket for trial;

James Lilly was found guilty of non-support and received a 90-day sentence suspended for 5 years upon the condition that he pay into the Office of the Clerk of Superior Court the amount of \$30.00 immediately, and each week until Lorraine is 18 years old, and \$20.00 for support of Gay until she is 18 years old, or until further instructions by the court with said sum to be reimbursed to Mrs. Lilly. An appeal was noted and the case was placed on the Superior Court Docket for trial;

Thomas Norman, Jr., charged with reckless driving, received a sentence of 60 days suspended for 2 years, a fine of \$75.00 and

costs, and told not to violate any Federal, State, or local laws for 12 months;

Roy Lee Boyce was found guilty of reckless driving and given a 60-day sentence suspended for 2 years, a fine of \$75.00 and costs, and ordered not to violate any Federal, State, or local laws for 6 months;

Coley Mabine was given a fine of \$75.00 and costs on a reckless driving charge, a 60-day sentence suspended for 2 years, and told not to violate any Federal, State, or local laws for 6 months;

Tracy Edward Tarr, Jr., charged with reckless driving, was given a 30-day sentence suspended for 12 months, a fine of \$50.00 and costs and ordered not to violate any Federal, State, or local laws;

Danny Burnette Riggs was taxed with costs of court on a speeding charge.
