Winslow Named To Top Position

Clifford S. Winslow of Belvidere was named Clerk of the N.C. Yearly Meeting of Friends at the Friends' annual state meeting held August 7-10 at Guilford College. This position is the same as a state chairman.

There are approximately 14,000 Friends in North Carolina and some 370 Friends in Perquimans County. Attending the state meeting, were 38 members from the Up River Friends Church along with Rev. Archie Creed and 22 members from Piney Woods Friends Church with Rev. Ken Spivey.

Winslow's election came about by his name being submitted to a committee appointed by the Friends' Representative Body which is made up of representative members from Friends churches all over the state. This election committee contacted Winslow to see if he would be interested in holding this position. He accepted and his name was brought before the

membership attending the annual meeting. There were no other nominations from the floor and Winslow was elected to this top position by acclamation.

In this position, Winslow will be presiding as clerk at annual meetings as well as presiding over meetings of the Representative Body four times a year. His job will include visiting as many as possible of the 70 Friends Meetings across the state. He will serve as a member of the Executive Committee, Program Committee, Board of Trustees of the Friends Home for the Aged, and as an ex-officio member of the Church Extension Committee.

Winslow's appointment is for one year, but he is eligible to be clerk for a maximum of five years.

Concerning his appointment, Winslow said, "It's a real challenge and a real privilege, I feel to have been chosen to serve in this capacity."

BECOMING CHRISTLIKE IN OUR RELATIONSHIPS

Romans 12: 9-21
Shakespeare said, "We must love men ere they will seem to us worthy of our love."

Seneca said: "We are members of one great body, planted by nature in a mutual love, and fitted for a social life. — We must consider that we were born for the good of the whole."

It is at the point of human relationships that we seem to be the greatest failures: How fortunate we are as Christians to have the example and the teachings of Jesus Christ concerning this matter. Jesus had much to say about human relationships.

The apostle Paul was greatly influenced by the teachings of Jesus on this subject. In our scripture passage for this lesson he uses three words which help to sum up his admonition.

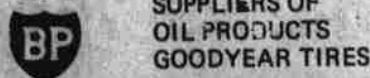
