Newbold, Perquimans County Game Warden, is urging every one who expects to hunt to get license in time. Hunting license for Perquimans cost \$1.10; state liense, \$2.10. A combination license for hunting and fishing in the county is \$3.10. Non-residents of the state who hunt in Perquimans must pay a license of \$15.25.

Full Enrollment

BOONE — Appalachian State University will not admit new students for its spring semester due to a capacity enrollment this fall.

semester is expected to be about 7,900 and the preliminary resident enrollment is 8,494.

Three exceptions will be made to the enrollment freeze, according to C.H. Gilstrap, director of admissions at Appalachian. Gilstrap said that Appalachian would continue to receive and admit for the spring semester applications from graduate students, transfers completing college parallel programs at community or junior colleges, and previously-enrolled ASU students who apply for readmission. Gilstrap said that the university also would honor commitments to some 50 entering freshmen and transfers whose applications are pending. "We are over enrolled, our faculty is overloaded, and we are faced with budget limitations in our state funding," Gilstrap said.
