The RC&D Measures were proposed by the eight working Com-mittees and will be in-corporated in the Project Plan. The committees were charged to keep in mind the overall purpose of the RC&D Program in Region R which is "to plan for and to promote the orderly development and prudent use of the Region's resources.'' These resources include but are not limited to: people, land, water, plants, animals and


