DANGER!

Rural and Small Town America

Big Government in Washington is tinkering with your independent telephone system (and the Bell System, too) — and the bureaucratic experiments can force up your local service phone rates by an estimated average of 80 per cent in the next 10 years, exclusive of inflation. The required rate increases will be even more in some remote areas — to the point many people won't be able to afford phone service at all. Your telephone company doesn't want this to happen to you.

The Federal Communications Commission is imposing so-called "competition" — some of which isn't real competition at all but an arbitrary division of markets — in selected

areas of telephone service. Primarily, this involves customer-provided equipment and intercity private line service.

Here's why the FCC experiment will result in your paying more for basic residential and small business phone service: Phone rates always have been "averaged" so you pay about the same as heavily populated urban areas, although it costs the phone companies more to provide service in less populated areas. Rates of residential users also have enjoyed the benefit of contributions from the charges paid by (1) long distance callers and (2) users of sophisticated business communications services.

To meet the contrived competition imposed by the FCC, your phone company will have to charge each customer according to the actual costs of providing service. The results will be tough on residential users, rural customers and small businesses — and especially so for retired folks and others living on fixed incomes. Some big business customers can save money under the FCC's arbitrary policies — but you will pay more.

The telephone industry is backing legislation in Congress to reaffirm policies of the Communications Act of 1934 — the industry's basic charter from Congress under which we have developed the world's best and most reasonably priced telephone service. We believe Congress, not the bureaucrats who never have to answer to the voters, is the only proper forum for determining the nation's telecommunications policy.
