She is a member of the American Vocational Association, the Tennessee Vocational Association, Delta Pi Epsilon (national graduate fraternity in business), Phi Delta Kappa (national honor fraternity for education), and the Tennessee 51.3 percent Committee-A Committee of Women for Carter-Mondale.
