CONNECTICUT FISH CAPTURED IN LOCAL WATERS BY MATHEWS: Indicating that fish do quite a bit of traveling, Connecticut State Fisheries release number 3117 was picked up in the Albemarle Sound by Fred Mathews when he visited his gill nets on Jan. 12. The tags of the Game Fisheries Commission were attached to rock weighing approximately two pounds each, and the first two tag numerals indicate that the two fish must have been released at the same time. Mathews arranged to have the tags returned to Connecticut where the Commission will compare notes and gather further data on the fish movements in general. The voyage down the coast to the Albemarle Sound covers several hundred miles.

## Three Local Students Named To Dean's List

Fewer students made this year's fall semester Dean's List at North Carolina State University - half as many - than for the same period a year ago.

The sharp decrease in Dean's List students, despite increased enrollment, results from a new university policy raising the requirements for Dean's List honors.

The policy was approved last spring by Chancellor Joab L. Thomas. Thomas said the higher standards were necessary to maintain the integrity of Dean's List honors. He noted that more than four of every ten students earned honors in previous years. The new requirements limit the number to fewer than two of every ten full-time students.

Chancellor Thomas said 2,053 students earned honors this past fall compared to nearly 4,100 a year ago. Higher requirements may be only part of the reason for the decrease, however, since the number of all "A" students also decreased. The decrease is an indication that professors may also be grading "harder." A total of 252 earned all "A's" compared to 326 last year.

Chancellor Thomas praised the honor students and noted that they are studying in many of the most difficult fields of higher education, such as engineering, the physical and biological sciences, textiles and architecture.

N.C. State had an enrollment of about 17,000 students for the fall semester and offers degrees in more than 80 fields of study.

The following are the Perquimans County Dean's List students, their fields of study, and parents:

Stanley J. Winslow, son of Mr. and Mrs. C.S. Winslow of Rt. 1, Belvidere, is an agronomy major who earned recognition on the Dean's List with a Perfect "A" Record for the fall semester. Two Hertford students received recognition for the "B plus" or better listing: Catherine F. Evans, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.L. Evans of Rt. 1, Hertford. Ms. Evans is majoring in computer science; and Richard S. Hoskins, a zoology major and the son of Mr. and Mrs. R.S. Hoskins also of Hertford.
