Recipe Corner

The following recipe was submitted by Mrs. Mae Wreathy Hollowell of the Bay Branch Extension Homemakers Club. Readers are invited to share their favorite recipes through this column.

EGG SURPRISE TURNOVERS
 1/2 lb. bulk pork sausage
 1 T. chopped chives
 4 hard-cooked coarsely chopped eggs
 1 can (10 1/2 oz.) cream of mushroom soup, undiluted
 Pastry:
 2 c. flour
 1 T. salt

3/4 c. shortening
 5 to 6 T. cold water
 (The night before) Slowly brown sausage, breaking up with fork; drain. Combine sausage, chives and eggs in mixing bowl. Blend 3/4 c. mushroom soup into egg mixture. Reserve remaining soup for sauce. For pastry, combine flour and salt, cut in shortening with fork or pastry blender until pieces are size of small peas. Sprinkle water a tablespoon at a time over part of mixture. Gently mix with fork until all is moistened. Form into a ball. Roll out on lightly floured

board or pastry cloth to 1/4 inch thickness. Cut into eight 4 x 4 inch squares. Place 1/4 c. filling on lower half of each square; fold top half over to make a triangle. Seal edges by pressing together with a fork. Cover and refrigerate over night.

(In the morning) Bake on a baking sheet in a 450 degree oven for 15 to 20 minutes, or until nicely browned. Serve with mushroom sauce made from reserved soup, heated and blended with milk to desired gravy consistency. Yield: 8 servings.
