Plant After Frost Risk Has Passed

Warm season vegetable crops, such as green beans (snap beans) and lima beans, can be planted as soon as the risk of frost has passed. This date varies in North Carolina, depending on where you're located.

Practical early planting dates range from around April 1 in eastern sections, to mid-April in the Piedmont, to late April in western sections, according to North Carolina State University information.

One common mistake to avoid is planting too deep. NCSU specialists point out that seedlings are tender and have a rough time breaking through the soil, if they are planted too deep. The smaller the seed, the more shallow the planting should be. A good depth would be about a quarter of an inch for tiny seeds.

truck alley back of Church Street. **SHERIFF WINSLOW SAW VERNON CASTLE KILLED IN CRASH:** Living in Hertford today, one of the town's most prominent citizens is an eyewitness to the death of Vernon Castle, the male half of the famous dancing team of Vernon and Irene Castle, whose lives were the basis of the moving picture, "The Story of Vernon and Irene Castle," which played at the State Theatre on Tuesday. Sheriff Winslow, seeing the picture,

was reminded that Vernon Castle was an instructor at Fort Worth in 1918, when the United States was rushing fragile training ships and untrained men into the air in preparation for sending them across the seas to the battlegrounds of France. Sheriff Winslow was training there at Fort Worth when Castle stalled his aeroplane in an effort to avoid colliding with a student flyer who was just taking off from the field. His plane crashed and Castle died almost instantly, the student who was riding with Castle, however, survived. The Sheriff also has pictures of the crash and other photographs of Castle. He happened to be loafing nearby on the Fort Worth field when the crash occurred. Castle was a member of the Royal Flying Corps, and along with many other Canadian aviators was in the United States giving flying instructions. The crash, as Sheriff Winslow remembers it, took place in either February or January of 1918. There were so many fatal crashes on the field in Texas that it is hard to remember each one separately. In fact, 101 flyers and student flyers

were killed there in the rush of training.

AWARDED MEDAL

Coast Guard Chief Machinery Technician Carlie E. Ange Jr. whose wife, Norma, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elisha S. Winslow of Belvidere, was awarded the Coast Guard Achievement Medal.

He was cited for outstanding achievement from June 1975 to April 1977 aboard the Coast Guard cutter Burton Island, homeported in Long Beach, Calif.

During that period, Chief Petty Officer Ange served as the senior supervisor of the B-1 engineroom and was instrumental in keeping his ship operational despite numerous engineering casualties while deployed. An extract from his citation notes: "His constant unselfish approach to keeping Burton Island operational was typical of the consistently high standards of operational and personnel

readiness he set for his division. CPO Ange's attitude and manner had a profound effect on the entire ship, instilling a high sense of pride, devotion to duty and professionalism among his peers and subordinates."

He joined the Coast Guard in April 1961.
