New Homebound Service During the past year, the Perquimans County Library has been trying to make itself more accessable to the public. first through longer operating hours and second, through bookmobile service to all parts of the county. Despite all this, a large number of people in the county still cannot take advantage of the library or the bookmobile because they lack transportation, are handicapped, or are too sick to travel. To reach this group of people, the library is offering a homebound library service in which members of the library staff will visit in the homes of these people with books, large print books if necessary, and magazines or other informative material on a regular basis.
