Weaving Is Planned Topic

Mrs. Ross Inglis, President of Edenton Historical Commission, will speak at the September meeting of the Guild of Museum Friends in Elizabeth City. Weaving will be the subject of the talk and interpretive exhibit which will be held at the museum at 10 a.m. on Sept. 1. Mrs. Inglis, who first learned the art of weaving in Toronto, has two LeClaerc looms and has done commercial weaving which has been sold in Williamsburg. She, also, has been active in the Albemarle Craftsman's Guild for many years. Her collection of examples of Moroccan, Indian, Greek and Early

American weaving will be featured along with weaving artifacts from the museum's own collection. Information about the basic weaving class which will be taught at the museum through the College of the Albemarle's Adult Education Program will also be announced at this time. Guild members will be gathering for their first meeting after the summer and there will be a business session, however, the meeting will be open to the public. Refreshments will be served.
