Gray Owl Migrates

The Gray Owl has made plans to migrate south for the winter.

Nellie Sanders, Director of the Pettigrew Regional Library for seven years, has announced her plans to take a position in a Florida library system effective Nov. 30.

Ms. Sanders, known locally as The Gray Owl, will become Director of the West Florida Regional Library in Pensacola, Fla. She explained that her new position is "unusual in that the system grew from the Pensacola Public Library." She will actually be working under city management contracted to work with two counties.

As Director of the Pettigrew Regional Library, she worked locally with the public libraries in Chowan, Tyrrell, Washington and Perquimans counties involving some 15 employees. Her new position will involve 50 employees, five buildings, and two book-mobiles. The population of the area she will be serving is estimated at 300,000 or four times that involved in her present position.

Ms. Sanders said, "The thing that attracted me was that they asked for someone with experience in a multi-judicial library system. The fact that I negotiated the addition of Perquimans County to our regional system helped set me for the job. I'm very grateful to Perquimans County." She added that the West Florida system also needed someone with experience in a sparsely populated area. And she said, "The fact that there's year-round golf helps."

"I'm very grateful for the seven years experience I've had in eastern North Carolina," she said. "Eastern North Carolina is considered a leader in library systems across the nation." She cited the N.C.

Library School at Chapel Hill and the State Library System as two examples to the nation due to their innovations such as the WATTS line. "They've just been leaders in the field," she commented.

When Ms. Sanders came to the Pettigrew Region as Library Director, she was the only professional on the staff. There had been no director for the three prior years. "We now have five graduate certified librarians," she said. "And our local support has more than tripled. This shows that the region supports libraries."

"A well-trained staff is the finest contribution I can claim any credit for," she said. "I firmly believe a building full of books is not a library. I put people first. Service of the people in the communities comes first. My philosophy is to give people what they want," she continued. "On the other hand I try to see that we have a well-balanced selection."

Ms. Sanders explained, "My overall professional goal is to work with an extensive library system where there's room for creative growth. I'm interested in advancing the quality of public libraries in any way I can. I believe in them. That's been my life's work."

Ms. Sanders' replacement has not yet been named and she explained that that decision rests with the Library which is made up of three members from each of the four counties in the region. The members are appointed by the boards of county commissioners.

A mobile person, Ms. Sanders seven-year stay in the region marks the longest she has remained in one location. She said, "I've enjoyed eastern North Carolina and the State of North Carolina. I'm proud to have been here this long."
