Exceptions to safety-cap law

Though not widely known, the Safety Packaging Law provides two exemptions and one exception to its rule on safety caps!

You may have read about the man who died presumably after trying in vain to open his safety-capped bottle of heart tablets. The Law was not at fault here, however, because it explicitly exempts both nitro-glycerine tablets this man was trying to get to, and isosorbide dinitrate, a similar remedy.

In addition, the Law plainly allows the use of non-safety containers whenever requested by either the patient or doctor, just so proper judgment is used.
