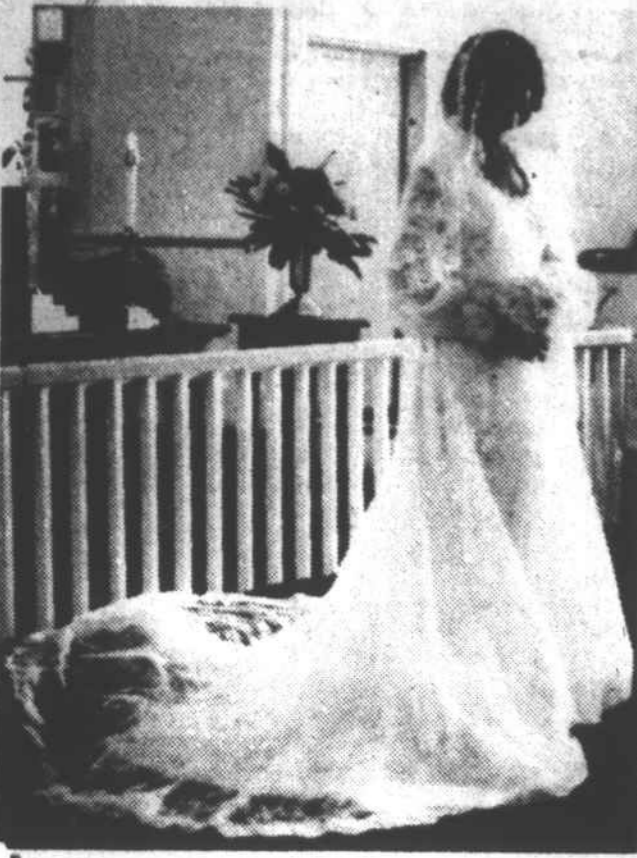


Ball-Edwards wedding

GREENSBORO — Miss Claudia M. Winslow was among approximately 380 sophomores honored for academic achievement at a special reception at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro recently. Miss Winslow is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford S. Winslow, Rt. 1, Box 320, Belvidere and is majoring in Nursing.

The purpose of the reception was to pay honor to the students for their academic achievements thus far at UNC-G and to give them a chance to talk with UNC-G faculty members and department heads about future academic interests and UNC-G programs.

The students were chosen on the basis of academic achievement from a sophomore class of 1,503. The total enrollment at UNC-G this year is 9,855 students.

Among the UNC-G officials and faculty members at the reception were advisors for the Junior Year Abroad Program, the chairman of the International Studies Program, the chairman of the Honors Council, chairman of the Latin American Studies Program.

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
