'You know of course, that no department head will eyer voluntarily reduce his or her budget. Last year you raised the tax rate .05 per \$100 valuation. This year you propose to raise it again. You, gentlemen, are the only pepsons in the county that can stop that trend.

-You simply have to say "we're not going to raise it again." I believe you should do that because it is sound fiscal policy and that would truly represent the feelings of the tax payers.




