Judge J. R. Parker presided at the Wednesday session of Perquimans County District Court and heard the following cases:
Roseann Williams, charged with driving under the influence of intoxicating beverage, received a 60 day sentence suspended for 1 year, a fine of \$100.00 and cost, and was told not to operate a motor vehicle in North Carolina for a period of 12 months (copy of judgment to be sent to home State);
Irvin Edward Johnson, Jr. was found guilty of driving under the influence and was given a 60 day sentence suspended for 1 year, a fine of \$100.00 and cost, and was told to surrender his operator's license, and not to operate a motor vehicle for 1 year except by limited privilege;
Carlton Robert Jones, charged with driving under the influence, received a 60 day sentence suspended for 1 year, a fine of \$100.00 and cost, and was told not to operate a motor vehicle for 12 months;
Steve Gilliam, charged with assault with a deadly weapon and injury to personal property (consolidated for judgement), received a 6 months sentence suspended for 2 years, a fine of \$75.00 and cost, was told to make a restitution through the Clerk of Superior Court Office for the Albemarle Hospital in the amount of \$28.00 and \$25.00 for Alexander Moore, and was told not to molest the prosecuting witness for 2 years.
James Isaac Turner was found guilty of driving under the influence and received a 60 day sentence suspended for 1 year, a fine of \$100.00 and cost, was told to surrender his driver's license, and not to operate a motor vehicle for 12 months except by limited privilege.
An appeal was noted;
Probable Cause was found in each case against Wayman Billups, charged with 2 counts of robbery with a deadly weapon, and larceny of firearms, and the cases were placed on the Superior Court Docket for trial;
Elsie Lena Jones, charged with assault with a deadly weapon inflicting serious injury, was given a 6 months sentence suspended for 2 years, with supervised probation for 2 years, and cost. The defendant was ordered to make restitution for the hospital bill to be dispersed to Blue Cross and Blue Shield through the Clerk of Superior Court, and also to make restitution for Court appointed Attorney;
Horace Edward White, charged with driving under the influence (2nd offense), received a 6 months sentence suspended for 2 years, a fine of \$200.00 and cost, was ordered to surrender his operator's license for the Clerk of Superior Court, was told not to operate a motor vehicle until relicensed, and to admit himself to the Albemarle Health Clinic for treatment;

Gasohol stages comeback

The use of alcohol fuels in motor vehicles is as old as the Model T and as new as this year's Indianapolis 500-mile auto race.
Henry Ford, for example, designed the Model T to run on gasoline, alcohol, or any mixture in between. And all cars competing in the 1979 racing classic at "Indy" were powered by alcohol fuels.
During World War II the U.S. operated an ethyl alcohol (ethanol) plant in Omaha to produce fuel for the Army, and gas stations in Kansas, Nebraska, and Illinois sold an alcohol-gasoline blend called "Agrol."
Today, "gasohol" is rapidly becoming the universal term for a blend of 90 percent gasoline and 10 percent ethanol. It's currently being sold in more than 800 retail outlets in 28 states.
The alcohol that goes into the gasohol blend may be distilled from corn waste, sugar waste, cheese whey, and numerous other waste products from the food and fiber manufacturing processes. It sells for about \$1.50 a gallon, but exemptions from Federal and, in some cases, state taxes make the pump price of the gasohol blend about two or three cents lower than unleaded premium. And the alcohol raises the Btain of the gasoline by about two points.
Through 1985, according to the U.S. Department of Energy, the contribution of alcohol fuels is expected to be modest nationally perhaps enough to reduce oil imports by as much as four-tenths of one percent. There just isn't enough distillation equipment available to produce more than that in the near future. The President's synthetic fuels program could overcome this bottleneck, however, and greatly increase alcohol production quickly, DOE officials believe.
However, the short-term regional impact is likely to be much greater. In agricultural states, alcohol fuels may become significant sources of local supply. And the potential beyond 1985 might be quite large - especially if major new production facilities are developed during the early 1980's.
Ethanol - made from food and fiber wastes - is the only alcohol fuel commercially available now, and the one likely to be available in quantity before 1985. Methanol (methyl alcohol) also is useful as a fuel and can be made from coal. Methanol could be used in large quantities in the mid-to-late 1980's when plants - if begun soon - could be completed and place in operation.
Methanol contains less miles-per-gallon energy than ethanol, but it's cheaper to produce. The growing market for gasohol could well provide the incentive - with financial encouragement from the Department of Energy - for largescale production of methanol.
