School Board has asked the town of Hertford to conduct an electrical service survey at Hertford Grammar School to determine the cost of powering an air conditioning system for its cafeteria. The request, which the board decided to forward at its November 5th meeting, came after Mary White, president of the Hertford Grammar Parent-Teacher's Association. and Bill Tice, principal at the school, met with the board to discuss the air conditioning of the cafeteria as a possible PTA project.

The survey would determine the cost of providing more electricity to the school, and that of any additional wiring that the project might require.

The board also reviewed immunization laws, and schools superintendant Pat Harrell reported that all of the records of students at the three elementary schools have been checked for compliance, and the records of high school
