In upset victory

Pirates dump Rams

The Perquimans Pirates ended up on top in a run and gun 62-61 upset win over conference foe Northampton Friday night.

Hot shooting and a fast moving offense spelled first half domination for the Pirates, as they soared to a nine point halftime lead, 35-26.

In the third quarter, though, the Pirate guns went stone cold, scoring only nine points, and they had to scramble from behind on a two baskets in the final 30 seconds to take the win.

Pirate guard Bobby Tolson fired in a long range bomb from the corner with just over 30 seconds showing, then

Johnny Frierson missed another corner shot but followed and scored with seven seconds remaining.

Using several timeouts, Northampton scrambled to get the ball upcourt, but the clock ran out on a jump ball, and the Pirates took the win.

Leading scorers for the Pirates were Ellis Everette, with 14 points, Frierson, with 13, and Tony Hickson, with 12.

Northampton had been ranked eighth in the state by the Raleigh News and Observer.

In junior varsity action, Perquimans ran its record to 7-1 with a 64-60 win over Northampton.

Perquimans led by as many

as 10 points in the first half, but had that lead whittled to 36-33 at half-time by a patient Northampton squad.

"We suffered a defensive let down," said Pirate coach Pete Hunter. "They're probably the best coached team we play."

The second half was nip and tuck, but the Pirates remained in control to register the win.

Leading scorers were Robert Mallory with 14 points, Troy Jackson and Nate Carson with 13 points a piece, and Donnie Parker with 12.

The Lady Pirates were dominated by a taller Northampton bunch, 73-19. The Northampton girls team is ranked 10th in the state.

Juniors lose on final bucket

The Hertford Junior League Basketball team fell to a strong New Bern team Saturday in New Bern, 45-43.

The local team held an eight point lead at the half, but saw that disappear due to pressure defense, combined with mistakes and poor shot

selection by the Hertford team.

With thirteen seconds left, Emmett Winslow missed on the front end of a one and one, with New Bern coming down the floor finding Keith Melton open for a fifteen foot jumper. A last second shot in

desperation by Richard Thach was way short.

The Hertford team was led by Jim Underwood with twenty-three points. Thach added seven and Eric Skinner chipped in six. The team's next game is at Edenton, January 29, 1980.

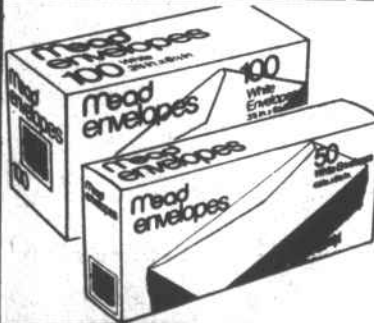
