toward educating male and female teenagers and preteens about becoming parents, with an emphasis on the risks and responsibilities of adolescent pregnancy and its lifetime impacts - educationally, psychologically, physically, and financially.

Also explored in project JOY's educational process is a look at the possible problems that may face the next generation's offspring, including alcohol, drug abuses, and poor nutrition.

According to Perquimans County Jaycette President Patsy Miller, the local chapter plans to commit themselves to Project Joy, and will strive to reach area youth through the schools and churches.
