

es, cut back to \$3,000 from \$4,000. Cox explained that the \$3,000 cut out of police department salaries was the elimination of anticipated part time assistance, and did not reflect any pay

Further changes in general fund expenses include: a \$450 cut from the fire department; a \$1,500 boost to the cemetery department, bringing that department's total up to \$12,200; a \$4,500 cut from the ice plant's budgeted amount of \$33,500; \$6,500 cut from nondepartmental expenses; and \$2,000 trimmed from contingencies.

The recreation department's allotted \$48,000 in operating expenses did not change, nor did the inspection department's budgeted \$7,500.

Utility fund changes The electric fund, originally budgeted \$979,770, has been boosted by \$34,404,

Cox explained that the \$34,404 increase was based on the expected refund from the Vepco wholesale rate case, and reminded that it had been budgeted as an expense in the general fund.

Amended electric fund expenditures include salaries and wages, up to \$83,579 from \$39,000, an increase Cox said absorbs budget cuts in administrative departmental wages; electricity for resale, up to \$689,845 from \$689,000; contribution to general fund, down to \$179,239 from \$181,300; and the addition of \$17,608 to cover electrical departmental expenses, a move Cox said followed the trend to make every department self-sufficient.

The water-sewer department's operating budget is up to \$129,427 from \$118,500, an increase that is largely due to the recent increase in water-sewer rates, according to Cox. Amendments in which makes that fund's total \$1,014,174. water-sewer expenditures include:

salaries and wages, down \$1,000 from \$58,000 to \$57,000, a decrease also due to the realigning of wages to other departments; operating expenses cut from \$4,500 to \$2,000; utilities, cut from \$12,000 to \$11,000; departmental materials and supplies, cut from \$18,000 to \$11,457; captial outlay improvements and sipment, cut \$2,000 making that allotment \$1,000; contribution to debt service fund, up \$31,970, where previously there had been none; con-tingencies, cut \$1,000, thus eliminating that expense; the elimination of a \$20,00 contribution to the general fund; and the addition of \$13,000 in "self supporting" departmental expenses, including payroll expense, employee benefits, and 201 study expenditures.
