

# Arrest made in Hertford break-in

The Hertford Police Department arrested a local man Monday for breaking and entering, and two other men last week for assault.

Police arrested Elwood White, 30, of 316 Stokes Drive and charged him with two counts of breaking and entering and one count of trespassing.

White was arrested Monday in the house at 303 Stokes Drive, following a call from the resident of the home, who had been out at the time of the break in.

There he was arrested for breaking into the house and for breaking in and trespassing on November 26. On both occasions White allegedly broke the

window in the back storm door, according to police.

Nothing had been stolen on either occasion. Police added that they believe the break ins were a result of a domestic argument between White and the resident of the house.

White was released on \$500 bond and will appear in court for a pretrial hearing December 2

Police also arrested Daniel Cooper, 40, of 206 King Street Thursday last week, charging him with assault on a female. Police say he allegedly assaulted his wife, Shirley. He was released on promise to appear in court.

She noted that such a center would serve not only the various needs of "The Lost Colony" production, but of the entire Albemarle area.

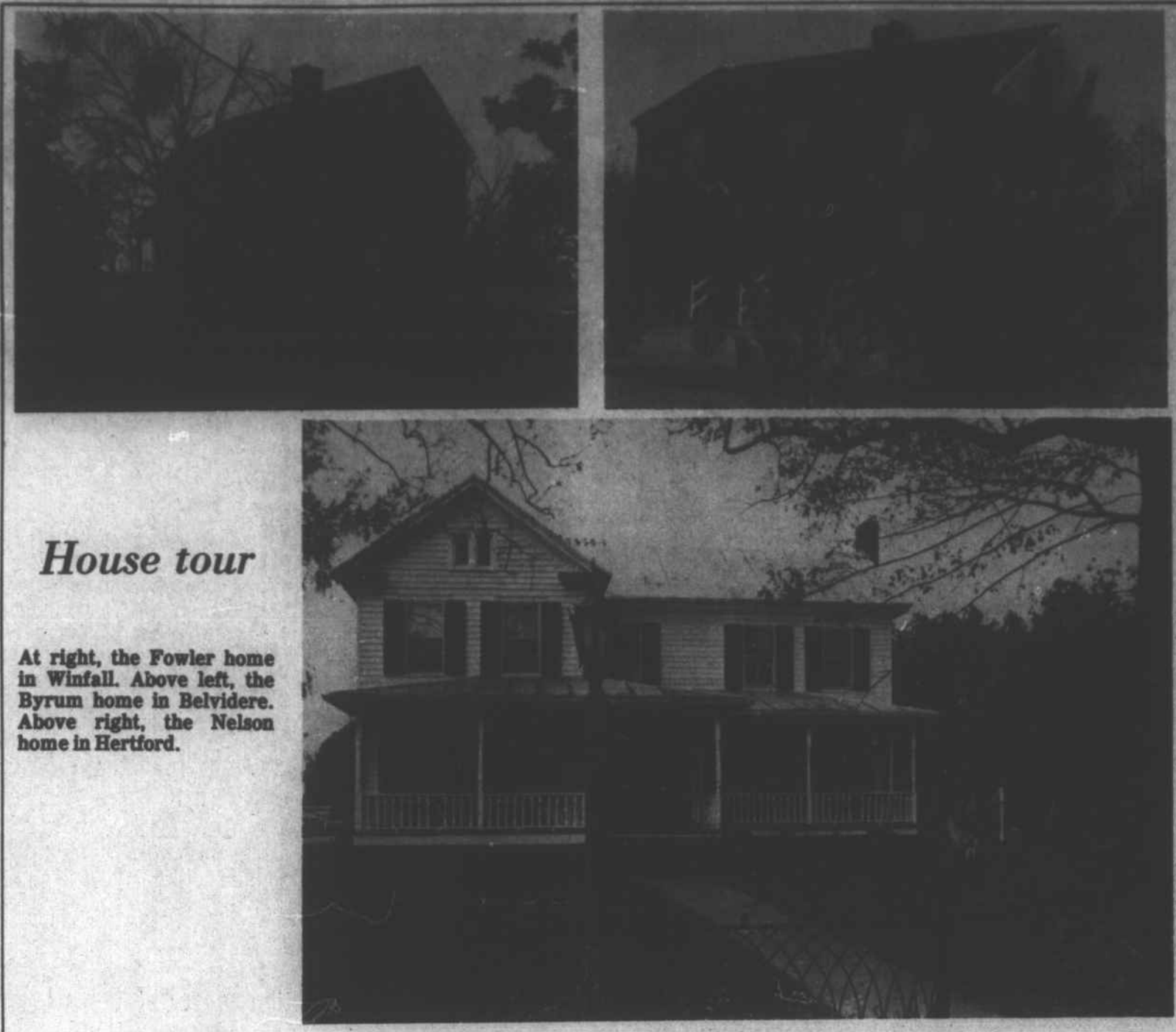
