Cook's corner



EDNA WOLVERTON

Spinach squares are delicious as an appetizer or a substitute for a sandwich with soup. The squares can also be served as the main dish accompanied by a fresh fruit salad.

Enjoy this versatile dish!

FLORENCE'S SPINACH SQUARES

Filling

- 2 10 oz. packages chopped spinach, cooked
- 1 c. milk
- 1 c. half and half
- 1 8 oz. can mushrooms
- 1 c. chopped onion
- 2 t. salt
- 1/4 t. nutmeg

- dash pepper
- 6 eggs

Crust

- 2 c. sharp cheddar cheese, grated
- 1 1/4 c. flour
- 1 t. salt
- 1/2 t. dry mustard
- 1/2 c. melted butter

Mix all the crust ingredients and spread evenly in the bottom of a large pan 9" x 13".

Combine all filling ingredients except eggs and spinach and simmer these ingredients one minute. Cool. Add to mixture of eggs and spinach.

Pour over crust. Cook 15 minutes at 400 degrees. Reduce heat to 325 degrees and cook 20-25 minutes. Cool. Cut into appropriately sized squares.

Now you know

The word "sausage" is derived from the Latin "salsus," meaning salted.

Dill seed is delicious sprinkled on potatoes, cole slaw and macaroni.

Properly whipped whipping cream will double in volume. The secret is to have a cold bowl and beaters, cold whipping cream, and to whip the cream before adding sugar and flavoring.

To help lengthen life of sheets and pillowcases, vary the way you fold them. Constant creases in the same places weaken the threads.
