## Estimated taxes due

June 15, 1983, is a date to circle on the calendar as a reminder to taxpayers owing estimated taxes. This is the due date for paying the second installment of Federal estimated taxes for 1982.

During Fiscal Year 1982, North Carolina citizens filing estimated tax filed more than 620,000 returns and paid in almost \$1.5 billion in taxes.

A declaration of estimated tax must be made if gross income for 1982 include more than \$500 in income not subject to withholding AND the estimated tax due is \$200 or more.

"Estimated tax" is the amount of tax owed for the year after sub-

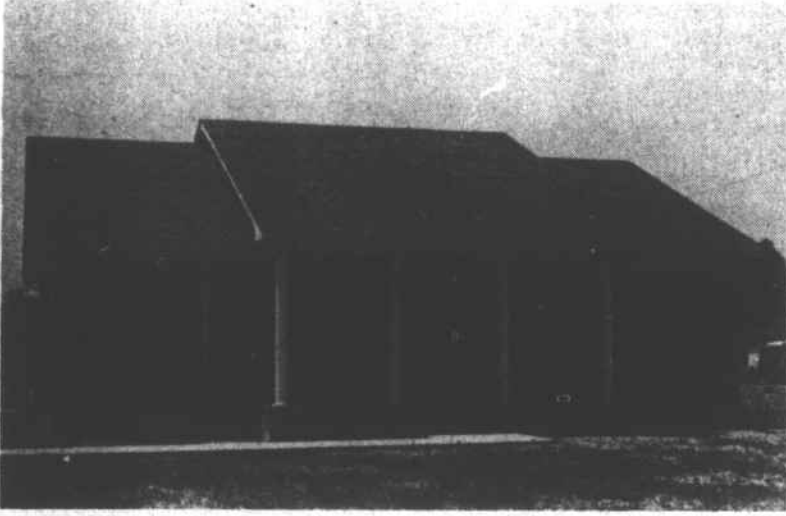

"With 200,000 more blacks registered, Jackson said, Helms could be out of work in North Carolina.

"Gov. James B. Hunt Jr., a Democrat who many think will run against Helms next year, is aware of black voter potential. He met with Jackson last week and endorsed legislation supported by the PUSH leader that would permit high school librarians and principals to register voters."
