Merritt said the missing wheels were not found.

"We have established extra patrols in these areas and we are questioning people who obviously do not belong in these neighborhoods," said Merritt. He added that lack of manpower prohibited constant surveillance.

Wanda Willette James, 26, who listed her address as Rt. 2, Box 204, Elizabeth City, was arrested July 16 and charged with assault and shoplifting following an incident at the Super Dollar Store in Hertford.

According to Merritt, a woman was observed allegedly shoplifting in the store July 12 and assaulted two store clerks who were attempting to detain her until the police arrived.

The suspect, according to Merritt, fled and left the scene in a vehicle, which was described to police by witnesses.

Merritt said the investigation is continuing to determine if the driver of the vehicle was involved in the incident.

Two pairs of children's blue jeans and a belt valued at approximately \$17.97 were taken during the shoplifting, according to Merritt.

Trial date for James has been set

August 10.

Seven people were served with a criminal summons and charged July 8 with engaging in an aggravated affray, following a group disturbance in a parking lot at the Stokes Drive housing project.

According to the investigation, Merritt said the brawl allegedly began before midnight July 7 as a result of a card game and ended with damage to a vehicle and one of the participants being thrown through a window.

Merritt said several injuries resulted.

Charged were: Grandy White Jr., 33, of King Street; Vernon Lee White, 28, Wilburt Lee Jones, 20, Milford Darnell Jones, 24, Charles White, 19, Jackie White, 18, and Vera Thach, 18, who all listed Stokes Drive as their address.

Merritt said Grandy White was also charged with injury to real property. He and Vernon Lee White were treated and released from Chowan Hospital for injuries sustained during the conflict, said Merritt.

August 10 is the scheduled trial date.

is "sort of like baring your soul." And with so much time and energy invested, the pressure for the novel's success is greater.

Of her characters, Mrs. McCall speaks fondly: "Some of the characters who start out being really cantankerous, mellow as the book moves on." The main characters include a white southern girl and her Japanese-American husband.

"In 1949, you just did not see mixed marriages," said Mrs. McCall.

Currently, the educational coordinator for the Edenton Historical Commission, Mrs. McCall is married to Kyle McCall. They have two sons. While in Hawaii, she served as

coordinator of Chinese, Korean, Japanese, Polynesian and other ethnic group mission work. She served as a volunteer for the handicapped in both Hawaii and in Miami, Florida.

Upon her husband's retirement in 1969, Mrs. McCall returned with her family to Edenton.

In addition to her volunteer church work, Mrs. McCall served as a summer worker at the Navajo Indian Reservation in Arizona.

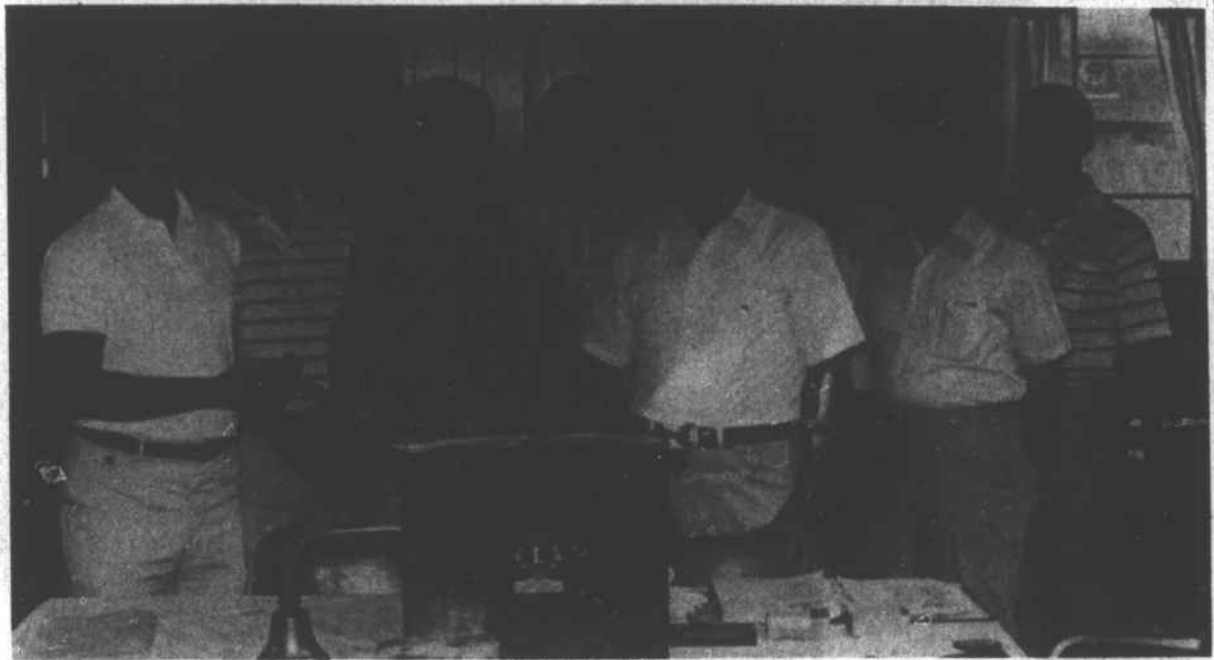
Lala and Ralph Riddick of Tyner, lost their home in a fire caused by lightning on July 5. There was extensive damage to all furnishings and belongings.
