Summer veggies make versatile dishes

Okra, eggplant, and tomatoes mato slices with eggplant slices are three outstanding and versitile summer vegetables. The combinations are limitless and possibilities delicious.

COOKS

Taste these two fresh vegetable dishes while the summer bounty is at its peak.

Summer Okra and Tomatoes 1 cup okra, cut in 1/2" slices

1/2 cup chopped onion 1/4 cup chopped green pepper

3 Tbsp. butter or bacon fat 4 tomatoes, quartered and

1 tsp. salt

½ tsp. pepper
1 cup fresh corn (optional)

Saute okra, onion and green

pepper in fat over low heat. Add tomatoes and seasonings. Cook until tender, stirring as little as possible. One cup fresh corn may be added. May be prepared in advance. Serves 4.

Eggplant With Tomatoes 1 medium size eggplant, about 1 pound

4 medium-size tomatoes, about 1 pound

2 tsp. finely minced garlic

½ tsp. rosemary 1/2 tsp. oregano salt to taste

freshly ground pepper 6 Tbsp. olive oil

1 Tbsp. finely chopped parsley


Preaheat oven to 450 degrees. Trim end of eggplant. Cut eggplant lengthwise in half. Place halves, cut side down on flat surface and cut crosswise into half-moon shapes, about one-third inch thick, about 34

Trim off ends of toamtoes and cut away the cores. Cut tomatoes crosswise into slices each about 1/2" thick. There should be about 32 pieces. Alternate to-

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Combine garlic, rosemary and oregano and sprinkle over lay-

salt and pepper and dribble oil over all.

Place dish in the oven and bake 30 minutes. Baste the lay-

ered eggplant with any juice that have accumulated around it. Sprinkle with parsley and serve. Yield: 4 servings.

SCS celebrates 50th Anniversary

More than 600 people turned abundant crops to feed this na-out to celebrate the USDA Soil tion and the world. Conservation Service's (SCS) 50th Anniversary. Conservation leaders from across the nation met at the birthplace of Hugh Hammond Bennett, founder and first Chief of SCS, near Wadesboro.

Representative William Hefner (D-8th District), keynote speaker at the event, state his support for the nation's soil and water conservation efforts, "The soil conservation porgram has for 50 years assured the maintenace of rich, productive farmland for the growing of

"The benefits of this program are no less today, and we must continue to build upon the work that Dr. Bennett put forth for the everlasting betterment of mankind."

Supporting a strong federal conservation effort, Hefner said, "I believe we must continue funding for the soil conservation programs instead of cutting them drastically as proposed in the FY-86 budget."

Frank H. Jeter Jr., representing the North Carolina Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, read a joint resolution of the North Carolina General Assembly that had been passed that day.

In addition to saluting the Soil Conservation Service on its 50th Anniversary and recognizing the conservation acievements of the past 50 years, it called for continued national, state and local support for these efforts.

Also, as part of the activities, the Anson County Soil Survey was kicked off with its first acre ceremony. Soil surveys provide landusers with detailed information about soil locations and limitations for various uses.




