

## Pick-up to be raffled by Skills

If you would be willing to spend a couple of bucks on a chance to win a truck and help some unfor-tunate people at the same time, read on.

Skills, Inc., a sheltered workshop that trains handicapped people with job skills, is raffling off a 1983 Toyota longbed pickup truck for \$2 a chance. Profits from the raffle will be used to buy much-needed equipment for the three-year-old workshop.

Located in Pasquotank County, Skills serves Chowan, Perquimans, Pasquotank, Camden, and Currituck counties. Within the last 15 months, Skills has placed 23 handicapped people into private jobs. "It costs a county \$13,000 a year to keep people on welfare, and these pople would still be on the welfare role if not for us," said Director Max Mercer. "But because of the training and the job placement they got here, they're now eartning their money, paying their taxes, and they're also putting money back into the community," he said.

But unless the private, nonprofit organization has a succedssful raffle, Mercer is concerned that the good results of the workshop will be dampened if not completely snuffed out. Profits from the raffle will be used to buy a dust-removal system and a heavy-duty table saw.

The dust removal system is be-ing mandated by the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration, and the table saw, Mercer hopes, will help the workshop to eventually become financially self-sufficient. The workshop makes money by fulfilling contracts with private companies for jobs such as cut lumber. The Weyerhaeuser Company has given Skills some of its most lucritive contracts, and they are offering the workshop even more work cutting deck posts, step stringers, and patio blocks. But the single table saw that Skills has canot handle the demand. "The saw we have now can only be used a few minutes an hour. The rest of the time it's overheated,"said Mercer.

Mercer says that ticket sales must pick up if the workshop's goal of selling 5,000 tickets is

met. He and members of Skill's Board of Directors have taken the truck, which has a \$7,900 retail value, to county fairs, fall festivals, club meetings, and most anywhere else where they could sell some tickets. But only about 1,000 tickets have been sold, and Mercer is hoping that businesses and more private citizens will become interested in winning the truck and making a tax-deductible donation at the same time.

The drawing for the truck will be held Nov. 16 at Perry Toyota. Wayne Perry, who owns the Elizabeth City dealership, donated a portion of the truck to Skills. He is on the Board of Directors.

Tickets are available by mail, or a member of the Skills family will deliver the tickets if more than 20 are bought. To purchase a ticket, contact Skills at Rt. 2, Box 362 or call 264-3377.
