Cooking with Ashley

While everyone is home for the holidays, they are sure to feast on turkey and ham! At some point, we all tire of ham and turkey, so here are two quick alternatives!

BROILED TUNA SANDWICHES
6 hamburger bun halves
margarine or butter
1 7-ounce can tuna, drained & flaked
1 cup shredded sharp cheese
¼ cup minced green pepper
2 tablespoons minced onion (optional)
¾ cup mayonnaise

Spread buns with a light coating of butter or margarine. Mix remaining ingredients well and place on buns, making open-faced sandwiches. Place under broiler 5 minutes or until lightly browned. Serves 6.

These freeze well. If frozen, thaw one hour in wrapper before broiling.

GOLDEN CRABMEAT SANDWICHES

½ stick butter
¼ cup green onions, sliced
one-third cup fresh mushrooms
½ pound crabmeat, or one
7½ ounce can crabmeat, drained
½ teaspoon garlic salt
½ teaspoon cayenne pepper
4 slices toast
1 teaspoon lemon juice.

Saute onion in butter. Add mushrooms and saute slightly. Add crabmeat, garlic salt, cayenne and lemon juice. Serve over toast and top with hollandaise. Serves 4.

Summer 4-H jobs available

The N.C. Agricultural Extension Service, headquartered at North Carolina State University, operates five resident-type 4-H camps. The camps are located in Onslow, Richmond, Rockingham, Stokes and Buncombe counties.

Employment will begin June and last about 10 weeks, according to Juanita T. Bailey, Home Economics Extension Agent.

Camp staff positions involve leading and teaching a group of young people to provide hands-on learning experiences. Those persons over 18 years of age who love to work with children and can conduct classes and workshops in marine science, pioneering skills, nature study, mountain heritage, horsemanship, archery, sailing, crafts, canoeing, music, drama and swimming are encouraged to apply.

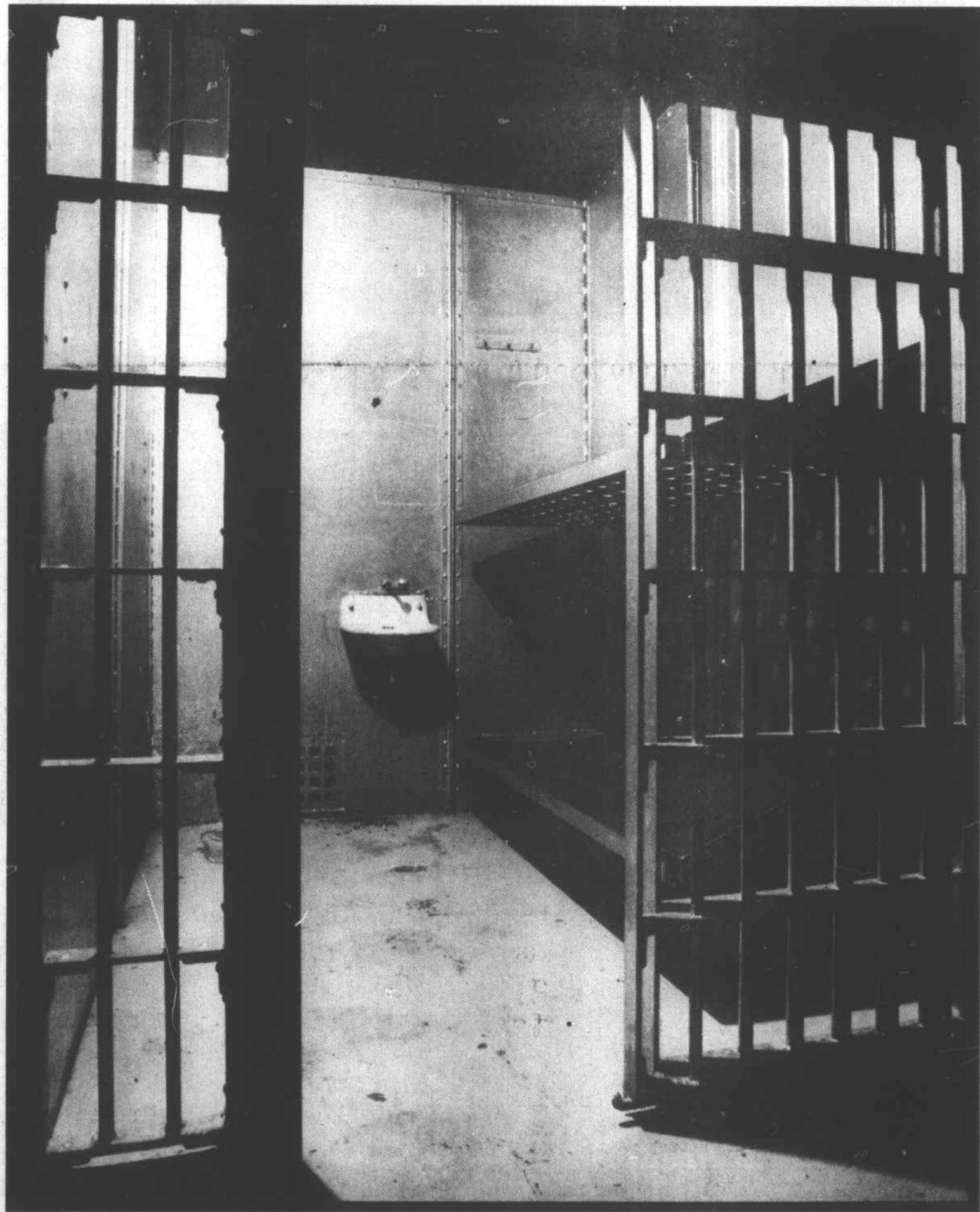

OXYGEN AND THE EYE
In a sense, contact lenses are a foreign body stuck on the eye. If you've ever suffered from having a mote of dust or an eyelash stuck in the corner of the eye, you'll know it can be extremely irritating. Yet this doesn't happen with the modern contact lenses. Why?
The main reason for this is that contact lenses float on a layer of tears that covers the cornea and do not make direct contact with the eyeball. In addition, contact lenses are made and fitted so that they are able to move slightly with each blink. This allows the eye to constantly trade new tears for old, alternately forcing carbon dioxide-rich tears out from under the lens and allowing more fresh, oxygen-rich tears underneath.
The amount of oxygen that reaches the eye is of primary importance for the comfort and health of your eye. In this regard, contact lens design has made enormous strides. Gas-permeable lenses allow oxygen to pass directly THROUGH the lens and to the cornea.
