Vernon, Va. in the 24th annual Needlework Exhibition, the oldest and largest needlework exhibition in America. There were around 1,000 pieces from 24 states of amateurs and professional stitchery in the historic Polomac Plantation, George Washington bequest to his foster daughter, Nellie Curtis Lewis. 
