Pettigrew library receives funds for bookmobile

Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company presented \$700 to Pettigrew Regional Library on Wednesday, to help purchase and stock a second bookmobile. Dick Flye, District Community Relations Manager, delivered the check to regional library headquarters with best wishes from Carolina Telephone, saying "We are very pleased to be a part of this ef-The Community Relations team recognizes the importance of bookmobile service to rural residents, and hopes to be able to help the library meet its goal in other ways in the future.

In addition, Secretary of North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources, Patric Dorsey, has notified Pettigrew Regional Library that it will receive \$18,000 from federal funds to assist in the bookmobile purchase. Recommendation to fund the Pettigrew reguest was made by the North Carolina Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) Advisory Council along with State Library Services and Construction act (LSCA) Advisory Council along with State Library Grants Administrator. John Welch. The Advisory Council based its decision on such factors as the geographic area and population served, bookmobile circulation as a

percentage of the total library circulation, condition of the current vehicle, and the availability or commitment of other funds for the proposed purchase. According to Martie Smith, Regional Library Director, "The success of our bookmobile service to our rural residents, and the funds we already had committed to

the bookmobile reserve account made our application one of the most Currently, one bookmobile serves as a mobile branch library for the en-

tire Pettigrew Region, which includes Chowan, Perquimans, Tyrrell, and Washington Counties. It makes twice monthly visits to stores, businesses, and fire stations, as well as the homes of home-bound residents. During the past four years the bookmobile has doubled the number of books it loans per year, and the number of people using bookmobile service has grown almost 200 per-

The purchase of a second bookmobile will ensure uninterrupted, dependable service during periods when the current vehicle on each side of the Albemarle Sound, thereby reducing overall milage and wear on the bookmobiles while serving the

same number of locations. The additional vehicle will provide more space for books, and more staff time for personal attention to the needs of its patrons

Smith explains, "With no increase in staff anticipated in the near future, we don't expect the new bookmobile to create any drastic changes in our scheduling. However, it will allow us to make the most of the staff time we have, and to allow us much more flexibility for considering future expansion as the need arises.'

Pettigrew Regional Library hopes to purchase the additional bookmobile by early fall. Of the total of

\$46,000 needed for the vehicle and book stock, \$20,000 has been put aside over several years from State funds, and Weyerhaeuser gave \$1,600 toward the project. The addition of the LSCA grant and gift from Carolina Telephone brings the library within \$7,300 of its target. "Excitement grows as we near our goal" Smith said. "This new bookmobile will be invaluable to u in maintaining-and expanding our services.
