Breakdown survival

It's a nightmare come true. You are driving along on a dark, lonely road when your car breaks down. Or perhaps in broad daylight your car just "dies" on an major interstate. Either case can be a frightening experience.

What steps would you follow for your own safety if your car broke down on the road? These sugges-tions, reprinted from "Road Ahead," offer advice.

1. The first step, of course, is to get out of traffic. When you feel your car begin to sputter, use whatever momentum you have left to pull off the road and onto the shoulder.

2. Use your emergency flashers to alert other drivers that your vehicle is disabled.

White Signal

3. Tie a white rag to the antenna or raise the hood of your car. This makes it clear to passerby that your vehicle is in distress. The white "flag" will signal to police that you need assistance.

4. At night, dawn or twilight, set up flares. Put one flare a car's length behind your car and a second flare at least 100 yards further away toward oncoming traffic. Also, set a third flare about 30 yards in front.

5. If you are near an emergency telephone, call for help. Such phones are usually numbered to mark your location, but you should also report what route you are on, the direction in which you were traveling and the vehicle's make and model. Spend as little time as possible walking along the road, especially if it is dark.


