Selma, N.C.-Harvesting and crushing ripe, juicy North Carolina muscadine grapes will highlight 'Grapes Galore,' Southland Estate Winery's first fall festival set to get underway Sat., Sept. 5, and continue through Sat., Oct. 3, at the winery located on Interstate 95 near Selma.

"We invite the public to come and participate in our first harvest season here," said David Fussell, president of the state's newest winery which opened June 1. "We'll be crushing the grapes in our production area and visitors will be able to see the first production phase of winemaking once the grapes have been harvested.'

The overall outlook for this year's grape season is excellent, according to Dr. Barclay Poling, NCSU horticulturalist, who recently completed a tour of eastern North Carolina vine-

"The crops I have looked at over the past few weeks are very impressive," Dr. Poling said. "Some of the wineyards are expected to yield anywhere from 8 to 10 tons per acre. In past years, we've seen an average of 4 tons per acre statewide."

Better production practices are cited as the major reason for the increased yield per acre, but Dr. Poling pointed out that grape growers had not received any "close calls" with the weather this year.

"Grape growers experienced a gir mild winter and spring, so we're very excited about this year's crop," he

In addition to the daily crushing of to you grapes at the winery, the month-long festival will spotlight special pickyour-own vineyard tours to be conducted at Hinnant Farms in Pine Level, located approximately two of miles from the winery.

Southland is expected to purchase the majority of grapes produced in the 20-acre vineyard along with grapes from approximately 350 addi-

tional acres grown throughout eastern North Carolina. This year's crop will produce an estimated 50,000 gallons of wine for Southland.

"By actually touring the vineyards, people who are not already familiar with our state's native grapes can learn more about them," Fussell said. "For instance, they'll be able to see how our grapes grow in clusters rather than bunches, a unique characteristic of the muscadines.'

Winning entries will be the ones that best capture the spirit of Southland as reflected in its Southern architecture, its delicate winemaking procedures, or in its people who visit and work

The climax of the festival will come on Sat., Oct. 3, with a Celebrity Grape Stomp scheduled to get underway in downtown Selma at 3 p.m. The grape stomp will be held in conjunction with the town's annual Railroad Days celebration.

Southland Estate Winery is located on Interstate 95, Exit 98, at Selma and is opened for tours during the 'Grapes Galore' festival Mon.-Sat., 9 a.m.-6 p.m. Admission is \$2.50 for 21 and over; \$1.50 for 6-20, and under 6 admitted free. Vineyard tours are fifty cents per person.



#### **Dates of Mattamuskeet** duck hunts announced

Refuge Manager Larry Ditto announced the dates of this year's Duck Hunts for Mattamuskeet National Wildlife Refuge.

In addition to the regular 2-day hunts, a 2-day youth hunt will be conducted on November 27 and 28 for young people 12 to 15 years of age. The youth hunt will include a safety program, a tour of the refuge and the standard orientation. Actual hunting will begin at 1:00 p.m. and finish at sunset on November 27, and continue from one-half hour before sunrise until 12:00 noon on November 28. Parents, guardians, or sponsors of young people who wish to participate in the hunt should send a 3x5 card to the following address:

Each youh is restricted to one application which should contain the youth's name and address. A permittee may bring one hunting companion of this age group to share his or her blind. An adult 21 years of age or older must accompany the youth, but will not be allowed to hunt.

Each youth must have successfully passed a State Approved Hunter Education Course to participate. He or she must present a card or certificate demonstrating satisfactory completion of the course

Regular hunts will be held on December 15 and 16, 18 and 19, 29 and 30, January 1 and 2, 5 and 6, 8 and 9, 12 and 13, and 15 and 16.

Individuals wishing to apply for the regular hunt should send a 3x5 card with their name and mailing address Mattamuskeet Hunt

Mattamuskeet National Wildlife Rt. 1, Box N-2 Swan Quarter, N.C. 27885

They should list, in priority order, three choices of two-day hunts. Hunters may bring one or two companions of their choice. Hunter Education Training and Certification is required for all hunters under age 16 for ALL refuge hunts.

A lottery drawing will be held at Refuge Headquarters on Monday, October 5 at 1:00 p.m. to draw for both the youth hunt and regular hunts. Any application received by that date and time will be considered. Hunters who are drawn will receive further instructions by mail. Unsuccessful hunters will not be notified. Any hunter who submits more than one application will be disqualified.

Hunters may also apply in person for the standby lottery before 5:00 a.m. on the day of each hunt.
