# **Moses confronts pharaoh over slaves** Sunday school lesson

MOSES CONFRONTS PHARAOH. (Exodus 5:1-7; 11-1-5)

"The Lord gave the people favor in the sight of the Egyptians. Moreover, the man Moses was very great in the land of Egypt, in the sight of Pha-raoh's servants, and in the sight of the people." (Verse 11:3)

Our proceeding lesson dealt with God's call to Moses to go to Pharaoh and seek the release of the Israelite people. Moses gave several excuses why he could not do this difficult task, but God prevailed. God did assign Moses' brother Aaron to go with him to Egypt. They went to Egypt and gathered together the elders of the Israelites. They told them of their mission, that God knew of their affliction and was now ready to give them deliverance from slavery. Following demonstrations of God's power through Moses' shepherds rod, the elders believed the words of deliverance spoken to them and worshipped the Lord. Following this, Moses and Aaron went to their first meeting with the Pharaoh of Egypt. It turned into a confrontation between God, represented by Moses, and the Pharaoh.

which Moses made to the Pharaoh was not for him to release the Israelites, rather that he should give them leave for worship. Moses asked that they be permitted to go three days journey into the desert to make a feast and sacrifice unto the Lord. We do not know why; perhaps Israel had entirely ceased their worship of God. Maybe this would be sort of a revival. Maybe God was conditioning Israel in preparation for that which lay ahead for them. The Pharaoh refused the request. He upbraided Moses and Aaron for disturbing the Israelite slaves from their tasks. The Pharaoh's response was to order the taskmasters to increase their work load. In addition to making brick, they would now have to gather the straw for brick also, and still make the same amount of bricks per day. A CONFRONTATION CLIMAXES. (Exodus 11:1-5)

"And the Lord said unto Moses, yet will I bring one plague more upon Pharaoh and upon Egypt ... " (Verse 1)

The Pharaoh's resistance to Moses request for liberation of the Israelites brought on a series of nine plagues. These were (1) Nile River turned to blood (2) plague of frogs (3) dust turned to lice (4) swarms of flies (5) a murrain upon cattle (6) boils upon men and cattle (7) hail (8) locusts (9) darkness for three days. One of the

miraculous aspects of these plagues was that God made a distinction between the Egyptians and Israelites No harm came to the Israelites in spite of the fact that they lived among the Egyptian people. The las meeting between Moses and the Pha raoh began when Moses was sum moned before the Pharaoh, after the ninth plague. Pharaoh was willing to release the people but they were to leave their flocks and herds behind. Moses refused the condition as unacceptable. There was one last plague remaining and it would be the final, climatic one

Whenever convenient, the Bible should be read aloud. Whether along or with a study group, absorb the word of God with the ears as well at the eyes. The moving poetry of the Psalms, the drama of the people of God, the personal witness of the letters, the dialogue with Jesus, the appeals of the sermon, even the judgement of the laws, all become more meaningful when heard as well as seen. Not the least important reason to hear the Bible is that it is more easily memorized.

There should be an unhurried reading of the Bible. Some "quiet-time" ten or fifteen minutes, out of twenty-four hours, to be alone with God, isn't asking too much. If we "tripled" our time it would be more than two hours each day. A relaxed receptive mood is needed. It is true that once abscure words go on with new meaning as the power of the Holy Spirit words his ministry in our lives.
